An Ordinance No. 35

Providing for the submission to the voters of the city of North Platte, Nebraska, of a proposition authorizing the mayor and council of said city to borrow money and pledge the property and credit of said city upon its bonds to an amount not exceeding ten thousand dol-lars to be used for the payment of the cost of paving the intersections of streets and space opposite alleys in ficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund for the payment of the same when they be-

Be it ordained by the mayor and council of the city of North Platte, Ne-

Section (1) That at the election to be held in the city of North Platte on the 19th day of August, 1913, the following proposition shall be submitted to the voters of said city: "Shall the mayor and council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska, have power and be authorized to borrow money and pledge the property and credit o said city upon its negotiable bonds to an amount not exceeding \$10,000.00 to be used in paying the costs of paving the intersections of streets and spaces opposite alleys in paving districts in said city and levy a tax annually upon Mr. and Mrs. A. J.
