**Pioneer Resident Passes Away**

Mrs. Terrence McGovern, a highly respected pioneer lady of this city, died at her home in the Fourth ward early Wednesday morning after a protracted illness. Mrs. McGovern was taken ill with rheumatism two years ago and last winter suffered a paralytic stroke which confined her to the house since that time.

She was subject to severe spells and suffered intense pain during her illness but patiently bore it and uttered no word of complaint. For a number of weeks her condition was considered critical and relatives were notified. With the exception of one son, who was unable to reach her side before death came, all of her family were with her in her last earthly hours and devotedly rendered their assistance to make the end peaceful and happy but for two days she was unable to talk with them. At ten o'clock Tuesday evening she sank into a deep sleep from which she never awakened.

Mrs. McGovern was one of those ladies whom the world can ill afford to lose, a loving mother, faithful church worker and charitable to all, living a model christian life.

She was born in County Cavan, Ireland, January 28, 1844, came to America at the age of twenty years. In 1872 she was married in Philadelphia to Terrence McGovern, who died several years ago. They located in North Platte in 1878. To this union were born eight children, two of which are dead. Those surviving are Thomas B., of Omaha, Terrence, of Helper, Utah, Mrs. Wm. McGrath, of Omaha, and Mrs. Omar Huff, Mrs. Edward Garrison and Peter, of this city.

The funeral services will be held Friday morning at 8:30 at St. Patrick's church and interment made in the Catholic cemetery.
