"Shall the mayor and council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska, have power and be authorized to borrow money and pledge the property and credit of said city upon its negiotable bonds to an amount not exceeding \$10,000.00 to be used in paying the costs of paving the intersections of streets and spaces opposite alleys in paving districts in said city and levy a tax annually upon the taxable property taxes sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the interest and bonds, all as the same become due and payable at their maturity. Said bonds to draw interest at the rate of five per cent per annum from the date of their delivery, payable semi-annually and be evidenced by coupons to said bonds attached. Said bonds shall be drawn payable to the bearer twenty years after date but redeemable at the option of the city ten years from the date thereof. Said bonds and the interest coupons shall be payable at the
