## A Ordinance No. 38.

Being the annual appropriation bill of expenses of the city of North Platte, Nebraska, for the fiscal year beginning the second Monday in August, 1913. Be it ordained by the mayor and council of the city of North Platte,

Nebraska. Section 1. There is hereby appropriated the entire proceeds of occupation taxes collected during the fiscal year beginning the second Monday in August, 1913, for the purpose of paying the salaries of the police and city officials except the fire department and the water department, to be known as the official salary fund of 1913.

Section 2. There is hereby appropria ted the whole proceeds of the city's occupation tax on fire insurance companies for the use of the North Platte Fire Department.

Section 3. There is hereby appropriated the whole of the proceeds of said city 3 mills levy to provide and pay for the lighting of the streets for said fiscal Wallace, who visited the Vanderhoof year, to be known as the street lighting fund of 1913.


