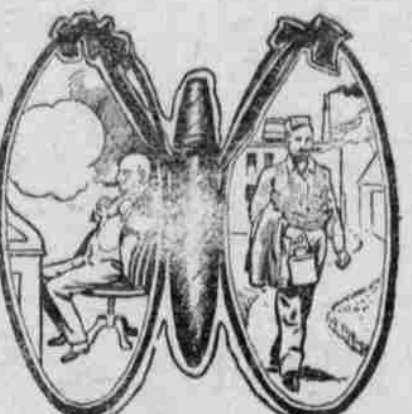

## Trite Remarks on Conserving Water.

F. E. Stueron in Lincoln Journal.  
Several years ago the United States government and all scientific people advocated the building of reservoirs in arid districts that there might be evaporation and the rainfall be increased. But today what is the government doing? Reclaiming the desert and taking the water out of Nebraska's greatest river to do it with, eh? Taking away an evaporating surface from 1,200 to 1,500 square miles of water and turning the water out upon lands further west. My ink well loses about a half inch of ink per day by evaporation, and it has an evaporation surface only one inch square.

If the evaporation from the Platte river would equal that from my ink well we can plainly see that one day's evaporation from one square mile would be 2,056,524,800 cubic inches of water that would be carried into the air in the form of vapor. If we figure the evaporation of the whole Platte river we will have a string of figures verging on infinity. But each figure represents a certain amount of rain which God has so arranged that when taken up as vapor again returns to the earth.

God in His infinite wisdom so arranged the streams of water over this globe that their united evaporation together with that of vegetation would supply the earth with ample rainfall. But what has man done? In Nebraska alone he has taken out of the atmosphere four trillion cubic inches of water. Is it any wonder that our corn burns up just when we expect a bumper crop? What right has man to meddle with God's great system of equalization? Does the text not say, "What God hath joined together let no man put asunder?"

If man by his irrigation projects for the reclamation of the western desert disturbs the equilibrium of God's balances is not it about time that God's people take a hand and restore to the proper place that part which has been torn asunder?

I, for one, say put the Platte river back in its channel. Let her mingle her evaporation with that of the Republican, the three Loups and Niobrara and the Missouri, then will the equilibrium of natural balances be restored and the fair state of Nebraska will yield her crops as of yore.

"It's the shortage of the corn crop that hurts," says a railroad man. "Corn makes tonnage. It makes the cattle and hogs fat and they fill stock trains. The corn itself makes more tonnage than wheat. Wheat is a big crop. It makes lots of business but when the corn crop is short we feel it. Nevertheless, Nebraska will have some corn. Nebraska has had a good small grain crop, and there will be considerable live stock to move. Conditions are not comparable to our troubles in the early nineties, although the tonnage growth will not be marked in this section this year."
