To The Public.

A petition regular in form was filed on July 28th with the city clerk under the initiative act proposing a new water ordinance. The clerks inform me that thirty days have elapsed since the filing of this petition and no election has been called for the reason that no deposit has been made as a guarantee of the costs of the election should such an ordinance fail to carry.

I have grave doubts as to the validity of the proposed ordinance, if enacted, for the reason that it provides that the city shall refund the price paid for meters already bought, if the purchasers should so elect, but provides no measures for raising and appropriating the funds to do so.

Under these circumstances I have suggested to the water commissioner the desirability of proceeding with the enforcement of the present ordinance providing for meter installation.

Father Objects to Daughter's Lover.

(From the Holdrege Progress)

Jack Vest of Wellfleet was arrested at the depot in this city Tuesday evening on the charge of intoxication and intent to injure by drawing a knife. The latter complaint was filed by Clair Hazen also of Wellfleet, and the lover of the sixteen year old daughter of the man who threatened him.

The girl was enroute from her father's home in Wellfleet to that of her mother in Cambridge, the parents being parted some time ago. The boy was enroute to Mascot to work. His parents live just south of Wellfleet and he and the girl had been keeping company for the past three years. He is nineteen years of age and wanted to marry the girl contrary to the father's wishes which persistence, according to the pater, interfered with her education.

When the young people left Wellfleet the father suspected that they might have plans for marrying and he too boarded the train, riding to Holdrege in another car. Upon reaching this place he warned the police to see that the young folks did not wed or engage a room.

He was intoxicated and became more so and returning to the depot he approached the boy with a knife. A panic ensued among the occupant of the waiting room and except for the timely arrival of the officers a tragedy might have occurred. Vest was lodged in the city jail for the night.

Vest was brought before the police judge Wednesday morning. He was fined a dollar and costs and released. Before the departure of this train, however, he was again taken on complaint of the boy, being charged with drawing a knife with intent to do injury. Vest was detained and the hearing set for the afternoon. After the parties concerned had discussed the matter the boy withdrew the charge. Vest claimed to have no recollection of having his knife in his hand. He said he might have been whittling, he whittled incessantly while under the surveillance of Officer Reed Wednesday. He made no threats to stab the boy, as was established.

It is rumored that the father gave his consent to the marriage before he and the boy had parted company.


Resolutions.
