AlLeypoldt & Wickstrom, of Hershey, have closed a contract for the sale of \$19,000 worth of sweet clover seed. The greater part of this was cut by the firm on lands adjacent to Hershey. If is now estimated that thirty-five thousand dollars worth of sweet clover seed will be shipped out of Lincoln county this fall and winter. Several cars of this seed will be shipped to Sioux City.

This is the fall we have no politics in Nebraska, the one year in forty odd without a state or county election. Thanks to our legislators in the future we will have an election but once in two years instead of every year. Of course here in North Platte we will continue to have special elections galore-thanks or curses, which-ever you please, to our adoption of the initiative and referendum.

A number of Lincoln county men who attended the state fair this fall and also saw the exhibits at the Lincoln county fair, have no hesitancy in saying that the Lincoln county exhibit, so far as it went, surpassed any exhibit at the state fair. They agree that our showing of grain, vegetables and grasses surpassed in quality those on exhibition at Lincoln. All of which speaks well for Lincoln county.

The fire Tuesday evening demonstrated two things: That North Platte's fire department is in a badly disorganized condition, which is not due so much to the members as it to the penurious treatment the department has received at the hands of shortsighted citizens who oppose every effort made to better the department. The other demonstration was the fine pressure given by the new pump at the water plant.
