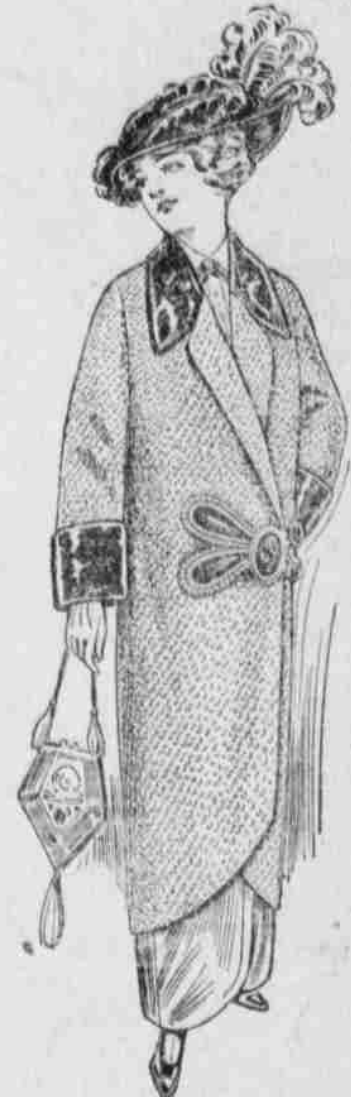

Old Timer Passes Away.

W. A. Vroman, a former resident of this city, died at his home at Gothenburg Wednesday. The deceased came to North Platte in 1874 and entered the service of the Union Pacific. Four years later he moved to a ranch northwest of town, where he remained until 1880, when he moved to the east part of the county, later moving to Gothenburg.

Will Erect Building.

Julius Pizer said Saturday that he had contractors figuring on a building that he will erect on his lots in the burned district on Locust between Front and Sixth. The proposed building will be 44x80 two stories and basement, and the estimated cost is around \$12,000. A business concern will occupy both floors as soon as it is completed.

Certificates for Lincoln Highway.

Instead of selling 5,000 certificates of membership to the Lincoln Highway association in Nebraska at \$5 each H. E. Frederickson, counsel for the state of Nebraska to the association, will attempt to sell 25,000 which will net \$125,000 for the building of the highway through the state of Nebraska.

The first lot of certificates has arrived in the city and Mr. Frederickson says he has orders for over 700 in the city of Omaha alone. He is figuring on selling about 10,000 in Douglas county and the remaining 15,000 throughout the rest of the state.—Omaha Bee.

Fremont Decides Not To Sell

North Platte's show of obtaining a berth in the Nebraska base ball league, diminished about one hundred per cent Saturday when Ray C. Langford received a telegram from Fremont which read: "Stockholders decide not to sell franchise now. Money returned you this day."

This probably ends the negotiations which began ten days ago for the purchase of the Fremont franchise. At that time Mr. Langford, representing North Platte, went to Fremont and entered into an agreement with the officers of the athletic association for the purchase of the franchise, this agreement to be ratified by the stockholders of the association. The stipulated price of the franchise was \$750, of which sum Mr. Langford deposited \$200 as evidence of good faith. When the stockholders met to ratify the agreement, the majority of them were opposed to selling the franchise, and favored maintaining a team during the 1914 season.

North Platte's only show of getting into the league is by increasing the number of teams from eight to ten. There is some talk of such action, but whether it will be taken will not be known until the annual meeting of the league in January.
