Lincoln County's Corn Crop.

The state board of agriculture figures the corn crop of Lincoln county this year at 1,174,282 bushels, or an average of nine bushels per acre from 130,498 acres. We are not advised as to how the board obtained these figures, but it is presumed that the average was based on a certain number of reports received from each section of the county, and is probably as correct an estimate as could be obtained.

While the yield per acre is very low, the total runs into pretty big figures, and if it is figured at seventy cents per bushel, the value reaches \$821,996.40. Were it possible for the farmers to sell all this corn they would be in clover, but unfortunately few of them will have any to sell, some will not have sufficient to feed the hogs they have on hand, while others, who raised absolutely none, will need to buy feed for their horses.

However, Lincoln county was not as hard hit as many other counties. In Buffalo county the average yield was less than five bushels per acre in Adams county less than four, in Clay county less than one, in Phelps less than half a bushel and in Webster less than two. These counties are among the heaviest corn producers in the state.

Tariff Promises and Prospects.

After six month's labor the democratic congress has brought forth the democratic tariff. The measure, although greatly transformed enroute since its original introduction, has been put through by practically a strict party vote, and will go on the statute books as performance of the platform pledge upon which the democrats went into power.

The avowed purpose of the new tariff is to readjust the burdens of the federal taxation in such a way as to relieve the consuming masses and make them weigh heavier upon accumulated wealth, thus reducing the high cost of living without disturbing business, reducing wages or increasing unemployment. The real test gauge, therefore, must be the effect of the new tariff upon the prices of necessities, and upon the aggregate living expenses of the average family.

If the democratic tariff will accomplish what is expected of it, and what was promised for it, everyone will rejoice, but even President Wilson is already hedging by saying that the tariff will only affect living cost slowly and indirectly. Apparently the democrats themselves are not quite so confident now as they pretended to be that tariff reduction is the whole solution, and only solution, of our industrial problem. Omaha Bee.

City of Lincoln Highway.

It is stated that the average cost of the Lincoln Highway through Nebraska will be \$5,000 per mile. The road through Lincoln county will be nearly sixty miles in length, and the cost would therefore be over \$450,000. No work on the construction will be started until the \$10,000,000 has been raised. It is expected by the officials to have this amount before next spring and work will be immediately commenced on the rough roads of the country. The bad roads through the states will be the first to get the attention of the builders, it being the desire to have an easily traveled road before the exposition in California in 1915.
