Good Roads for Little Money.

In sharp contrast to the manifest extravagance and incompetence characteristic of ordinary road management is the excellent record being made by Polk county, Nebraska. This county is not singled out for mention for invidious comparison with other counties, but because of the fact that they have tackled the road problem there and handled it successfully without waiting for government aid. Reinforced concrete bridges, built by local labor under the supervision of the county highway overseer, and uniform grading and maintenance by the use of a power outfit owned by the county have given to Polk county roads made of ordinary Nebraska dirt which are an object lesson to good roads advocates who are spending lots of unnecessary enthusiasm over macadam highways and booster campaigns. The best kind of a good road is the one which runs from your farm to the nearest market; which is built (in Nebraska) of the materials which the Lord gave us and which can be kept in good repair by the expenditure of a minimum amount of money and the exercise of native common sense.—Nebraska Farm Magazine.

Wagon's Fountain of Wine.

In the middle ages the commune of Wagon was sentenced to make an annual payment to the monastery of Strasbourg of 400 measures of wine. In 1793 the payment was abolished by the Directory. Under Louis XVIII. two merchants secured the transfer of the payment to them, by means of forged documents, for 1834, but the commune commenced proceedings against them, in which it was victorious on July 13, 1830. Since that date a communal festival has been held on that day, and from the public fountain erected to commemorate the victory wine flows for one hour in the day.—Westminster Gazette.
