### The Proposed Bridge.

The Lincoln highway commission has given out that in locating the road through Nebraska all turns, so far as possible, must be eliminated in order to shorten the route. In conforming to this rule it is plain that the route south of the river between North Platte and Gothenburg must be abandoned and a direct road laid out between the two points. In order to do this a bridge must be constructed across the river at a point east of North Platte. The people of Brady and Maxwell are very enthusiastic over such a road and the plan now suggested to raise funds to build the bridge is to form Vroman, Brady, Antelope, Cox, Maxwell and Hall precincts into a bridge district to vote that territory's share of the bonds; North Platte to vote its share of the construction price, and the remainder, or one-half of the cost, to be paid by the state.

The plan, as we understand it, is to construct a permanent bridge, steel or concrete, at a cost of about fifty thousand dollars. Twenty-five thousand dollars of this will come from the state, about one-half of the remaining half, or \$12,500 will be paid through the levy by the Union Pacific, and the remaining \$12,500 will come from the people of the six precincts and of the city of North Platte. As now figured the cost to the people of North Platte would be in the neighborhood of five thousand dollars.

It looks to us as though five thousand dollars so invested is a mighty good investment for North Platte. It not only means a compliance with the demands of the Lincoln highway commission, but it also means that with this direct route the number of people who come from the east part of the county to North Platte will be more than trebled. As the plans for this bridge become more perfect, we will have more to say on the subject.

Man Killed by Auto Near Cozad. A man, reported to be the father of the Christian minister who preaches at the Platte Valley church located a few miles east of Cozad, was killed Wednesday forenoon, by an automobile returning from North Platte, where the occupants registered in the land drawing. The unfortunate man is said to have been walking along the road and at the sound of the horn stepped in front of the auto, and was hurt so badly that he died Wednesday night. He is said to have been quite deaf and a man along in years and quite feeble. The accident is said to have happened near the home of Robert Hanna or Tom Marshall.—Lexington Clipper.

Let Contract for Ditch Work. The contract for the construction of concrete foundations and floors for ten bridges and for the construction of twelve concrete checks and drops combined, also one concrete arch was awarded by the Platte Valley Irrigation District last week to Paul Lawler, of Hershey and Clint Pearson, of Sutherland; having entered their bids as one. Their bid was about \$5,400. Work will be commenced on same Oct. 15th, as the contract calls for.—Hershey Times.

Mrs. Jess Thomas will arrive this evening from Evanston, Wyo., to visit Mrs. Clyde Cook for a week.



### One of Many Cases.

In speaking of the land registration the Lincoln Journal says: "Most of the Lincoln people who have registered have gone to Broken Bow as the nearest registration point. That many are not going to register on their own initiative is illustrated by the case of one man who left last evening for Broken Bow to register. He is on his way to register because another Lincoln man offered him \$5,000 for a claim if he drew within the first fifty numbers. The man who does the registering is in the employ of the railroad and his transportation costs him nothing. Registering will cost him 25 cents. The other Lincoln man has offered him \$5,000 if he draws within the first fifty numbers and proves up on the claim in the three years. To prove up he would make a year and a half's residence at \$3,333.33 a year. He looked at it as a bet worth taking."
