### Mayor Vetoes Whistling Ordinance.

City Clerk Temple received a letter yesterday from Mayor Evans vetoing the ordinance passed at the Tuesday evening meeting of the city council regarding the whistling of locomotives in the city limits. The state laws provide that the trains shall whistle for crossings and when someone is on the track, and the ordinance as it was passed would do away with all other whistling.

The mayor cited that the signals used are many of them very important and are for the safety of life. That to do away with them would cripple the signaling service more than it would help the public by doing away with the noise. The engineers do not blow the whistle merely for pasture but that all signals have some meaning. He also showed that such a law would do away with the shop whistle and with the curfew and noon whistle at the city water works.

The Chamber of Commerce was to have held a meeting Wednesday evening, but were unable to get a quorum on account of the inclemency of the weather. The meeting will probably be held sometime next week.
