Miss Friend Marries Doctor.

The Pasco, Wash., Progress of recent date contained the following notice of the marriage of Miss Harriet Friend, a former North Platte girl. Word was received in Pasco Monday that Dr. Murphy and Miss Harriet Friend, both of this city, were married at Sheridan, Wyoming, Sunday at the home of Miss Friend's parents, Dr. and Mrs. Murphy have left on a honeymoon tour of a month that will take them to Omaha, where Dr. Murphy's parents reside and to Chicago, where Dr. Murphy expects to spend a month at a medical clinic.

While not unexpected, the marriage of Dr. Murphy and Miss Friend was a surprise to the friends and relatives of both, who believed that the wedding would take place some time in January. Dr. Murphy has resided in Pasco for five years and has established a reputation as one of the leading surgeons of the city. Miss Friend, who is a sister of Mrs. George Austin, has lived three years in Pasco and her charming personality has won her many friends.

The annual report of the interstate commerce commission just issued shows that during the year ending June 30, 1913, seventy-six train accidents were investigated. These comprised fifty-one collisions and twenty-five derailments causing the death of 283 persons and the injury of 1,880 persons. Of the fifty-six accidents investigated by the commission it was found that nearly 7 per cent of the number were caused by the mistakes of employes. A disregard of fixed signals, improper flagging, failure to obey train orders, improper checking of the train register, misunderstanding of orders, occupying main track on time of superior train, open switches, mistake of operator in copying orders, and excessive speed were the principal causes of accident.

Three licenses to wed were granted Friday in the county judge's office. They were Harold F. Wright, 27, and Miss Beattie Bundy, 21, both of North Platte; Wm. Wayman 19, and Miss Ellen Sawyer, 18, both of Maxwell; and Harry O. Williams, 25, and Miss Freda Scott 23, both of North Platte. The two last named couples were married by Judge Grant.

Word has been received here announcing the death of Mrs. James M. Ray, formerly of this city, which occurred at her home in Long Beach, Calif. Mrs. Ray lived in this city with her husband for a number of years, but they have been gone from here about five years. Judge Ray was at one time county judge of Lincoln county.
