The ice harvest will last about four weeks and it will require between three and four hundred men to fill the houses in that time. The houses will not be filled to capacity, but there will be about 20,000 tons put in. As much local labor as possible will be utilized, and the remainder will be brought in mostly from Omaha. No definite action has yet been taken in regard to purchasing the Fremont franchise in the state league. With what players North Platte already has and with what they can pick up, it is thought that better results might be obtained by getting a berth in the league and build up a new team. Ray C. Langford expects to attend the annual league meeting which will be held at Kearney on January 7th, and at that time he will appear before the board and ask for a place for this city. If North Platte could get a place in this way it would save the expense of buying the Fremont franchise.

A colored man giving his name as William Thompson was arrested at the corner of Front and Dewey streets, Tuesday afternoon for being drunk and disorderly. He was so far gone that he was not able to walk and had to be taken to jail in a dray wagon.
