The New Currency Law.

The Federal reserve act as passed by Congress and signed by the president is generally acceptable to bankers and business men. It practically changes the whole banking system of the country, and is expected to give an elastic currency, prevent panics and bring greater prosperity.

The new system is to be governed by the Federal Reserve Board, consisting of the Secretary of the Treasury, Comptroller of the Currency, and five others to be appointed by the President.

No less than eight, nor more than twelve regional banks are to be formed in different parts of the country. These will be banks for banks; that is, the banks will deposit money in them as individuals deposit in ordinary banks.

Of the 7500 national banks a great many have now made application for membership, and it is expected that nearly all will subscribe to the stock of the regional banks. State banks that can meet the requirements of the National banking law may become members and derive the benefits of the law.

The most important part of the plan, the part that is expected to prevent panics, is the "re-discount" provision. When money becomes "tight" or scarce, the member banks can take paper that they hold, and that comes under the requirements of the Federal Reserve Board, and by turning the paper over to the regional bank, can get 50 per cent of its face value in new money. An important amendment to this provision was made to include agricultural paper and notes based on live stock, as paper eligible to re-discount.

The new circulation is to be guaranteed by double the amount of its issue in good business paper, and by local banks, and also by the United States. It is to be protected by a gold reserve of 40 per cent.

A recent issue of "Current Events" thus sums up the effect of the law:

"A bank that has good assets will always be able to get cash, no matter how tight the money market may be. And when there is a shortage of cash in one section of the country, the Federal Reserve Board can cause money and credit to be transferred from the regional banks in other sections to the regional bank where the shortage is. The whole idea is to make capital and credit flow where it is needed, and not pile up uselessly where it is not needed. That has usually been the immediate cause of panics. At such time it was impossible for a bank to find cash to satisfy creditors, although its vaults

might be bursting with perfectly good bonds and notes. There never was a scarcity of property in this country; there was only a scarcity of cash. Now if a member of the bank has good notes in its possession, it can always get cash on them no matter how "panicky" the money market may be."

He is a graduate of Bucknell university and from the law department of the Nebraska state university. He was admitted to the bar in this state last June and is remembered here by the fight he made against the city government in regard to the water meters.
