Beef Imported from England.

During the campaign last year The Tribune predicted that the proposed democratic tariff law would eventually effect the farmers and cattle growers of western Nebraska, inasmuch as cattle and cereals would be imported into this country under the free list. The first stage of the prediction is coming true, that of the importation, and while the price of beef has not yet been affected, it will certainly will as the importations increase. To bear out our contention we publish the following:

Washington, Jan. 9.—The free listing of beef and other food products under the new tariff law is causing enormous increases in the importations of food-stuffs into the United States, judging from figures issued today by the Department of Commerce. Food importations in November showed a marked increase over imports for the same month a year ago and a considerable increase over the preceding month of October. Importations of fresh beef which amounted to nearly 6,000,000 pounds in October, were practically doubled in November, when 10,856,516 pounds of fresh beef were imported. More than one-half of the beef imports came direct from England. There were 11,000 pounds of pork and 32,000 pounds of mutton imported.

Cattle importations in November numbered 123,118 head, valued at \$3,309,723, against 43,758 head valued at \$829,368, in November, 1912. The total number of cattle imported in October November under the new tariff law was 253,757. They were valued at \$6,704,790.

Importations of wheat in November were 127,000 bushels, against 2,000 bushels in November, 1912, and flour, 10,824 barrels, against 6,190 barrels in November, 1912. Importations of oats in November were 5,132,308 bushels, against 4,266 bushels in November, 1912. Importations of potatoes were 764,863 bushels, against 10,668 bushels in November, 1912.

Platte Valley Items.

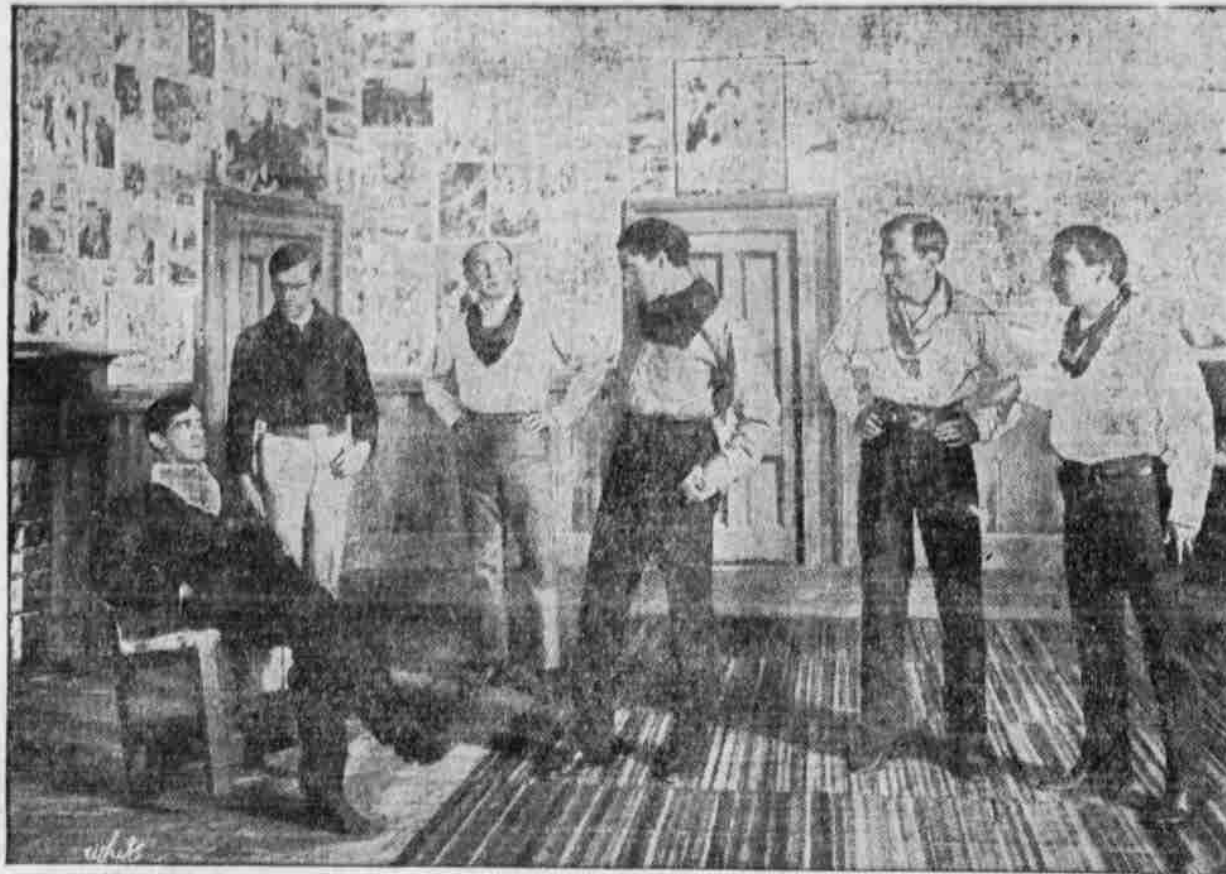
The Platte Valley Aid Society will meet at the home of Mrs. D. A. Carr Thursday January 15th, afternoon only.

Fred Fredrickson Retires.

Engineer Fred Fredrickson has retired from service and yesterday was placed on the Union Pacific pension list. Mr. Fredrickson retired after about thirty-five years of service with the company. He came to North Platte in September, 1881, from Omaha, where for two years he had been employed, first as fireman and later as boiler. Prior to going to Omaha he fired four years and ran two years on the Burlington, so that he has railroaded forty-one years. During his first year's residence in North Platte he filled the position of boiler, and was then sent out as a freight engineer. In 1899 he was a passenger run, which he held until the first of last month.

Mr. Fredrickson retires with a clean record, a record that characterizes him as a capable, careful and conscientious engineer. He was one of the first men this writer met in North Platte; both came within a few days of each other in September, 1881, and boarded and roomed at the Nebraska House. This writer admired him then for his courteousness, his pleasant manners and his clean habits, goodly traits that he has always maintained. Mr. Fredrickson has ever been a highly esteemed citizen, and every acquaintance is a friend.

Grand Island Wins Match.

The bowling match held Friday evening between Grand Island and North Platte resulted in a score of 2352 to 2251 in favor of the visiting city. The high score for a single game was made by Bell of Grand Island who bowled 189. Baird of Grand Island made the highest score, bowling 490.

Following are the scores: Grand Island, Baird 490, Alter 487, Harrison 471, Bell 449, Cowton 455; North Platte, Rodden 433, Starkey 469, Eshelman 452, Musselman 458, Landgraf 453. Starkey bowled the high score for North Platte both in three times up and in a single. His high score for a single game 176.

F. R. Burgeson, a prominent farmer from Stromsburg, arrived in the city Saturday morning to visit at the state experimental farm south of the city. Mr. Burgeson recognizes the good that can be received from the farm and comes from a distance of 150 miles to study the different results that can be obtained by different methods of farming. He speaks very highly of the practicability of the farm and the help that is to the farmer.

A large number of the water consumers in the city are installing meters as fast as they can be put in. The meters are being thoroughly tested at the water station before being installed to make sure that they are exactly right. Each meter is put under four tests for accuracy and are made to test right in each trial.

Receive State School Funds.

County Supt. Cleo R. Chappell is in receipt of the state funds to be distributed among the schools of the county. These funds are distributed to each district according to the number of pupils in the district. The entire amount to be distributed is \$4416.27, and it will be distributed among 4,867 children the number registered in the county. Miss Chappell has also received the state aid fund to be distributed in the districts where they cannot afford more than seven months of school. The amount of this is \$209. There are four schools in the county that receive benefit from this fund; they are as follows: districts 29, 62, 93 and 115.

City Engineer C. J. McNamara and the ordinance committee of the city council are working on a plan to define the exact boundaries of the city of North Platte. Much discussion comes up at each meeting of the council in regard to some taxpayers paying their taxes because they do not call themselves in the city, and the council ordered that the boundaries be defined in order to eradicate all difficulty. Some of the larger tracts joining the city limits will be left out of the plat, but the smaller ones will be included if they are already laid off in city blocks and the streets surveyed.
