Evolved From the Lyre of the High Priest of Osiris.

The history of the piano counts as a day compared to the barp. We have authentic records that as early as 1800 B. C. the first lyre was evolved Cleo R Chappell, salery for Jan 133 33 from the mind of the high priest of Osiris, who in one of his daily waiks Ira Simpson, acting deputy along the banks of the river Nile found an empty tortoise shell spanned with dried ligaments. Happening to strike it, he noticed that it gave forth pleasing sounds, and he at once made an instrument on the plan of the tortoise

From the lyre it was but an easy step to the barp, now the most famous instrument in the world. Milesius, one of the Phoenician priests, carried it with him in his conquest to Ireland, and there he planted it among the music loving Celts in 1260 B. C. The royal instrument became a controlling feature in druidical worship, and the harpist or bard ranked with royalty, the prophet and the priest. The druids advanced the harp from eleven to thirty-two strings and crowned their efforts in its improvement by the evolution of the pillar, which has ever since found universal adoption.

Our modern harp consists of forty five or forty-seven strings, seven pedals-one for each note in the octaveand the wonderful instrument shares with the plane and organ the faculty of being autonomous-that is to say, it needs no accompaniment and furnishes both melody and harmony .- Miss Loretta De Lone in New York Tribune.
