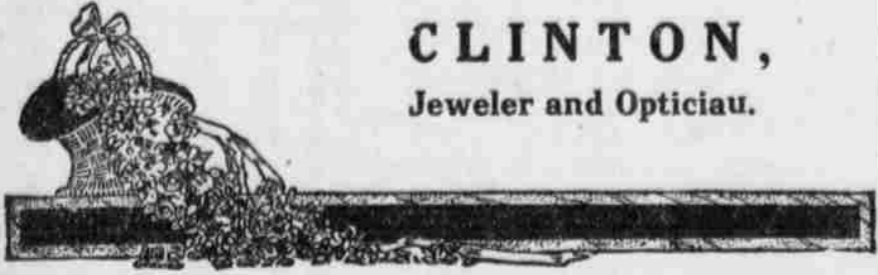

Shull Case Continued.

Hearing on the case of M. S. Shull was held Thursday evening before United States Commissioner O. E. Elder and Mr. Elder took the case for deliberation. He later decided to continue the case until March 4, and fixed the bond at \$750. Postoffice Inspector Geo. H. Booker appeared against the defendant and gave evidence which he had gathered, and Attorney J. G. Beeler appeared for the defendant and moved that the evidence be thrown out as being irrelevant.

Frank Ormsby Dies in Texas.

Frank H. Ormsby, a former North Platte boy, died at Mineral Springs, Texas, February 7th, after a short illness, at the age of forty-three years. For ten years past he had been manager of the Burton-Lingo lumber company at Ft. Worth Texas, having gone to that city from Kearney, where he lived for a number of years after leaving North Platte, and it was in Kearney that he was married. He left North Platte about twenty years ago, but will be well remembered by the older residents of our town. Mr. Ormsby is survived by a wife and two boys, one aged seventeen and the other twelve.

District Court Meets.

The February term of the district court opened yesterday, but the first day was spent in making arrangements for the cases. The jury was called for this morning and the case of the state vs King, charged with shooting a Japanese laborer, will come up this afternoon. This morning was spent in impeding the jury. Several cases of importance will be up this week for hearing and this will be a busy week.

Considerable objection has been aroused recently in the city by the reported high school dances which have been occurred this winter, and dances were strongly attacked at one of the meetings Sunday and the board of education and faculty were very strongly censured. One of the faculty announced at the meeting that the dances were not given by the high school and that they had nothing to do with them. Different pupils give them and invite whom they wish and there is never an exclusive high school attendance. Application was made to the faculty and board of directors at the first of the school year and the dances were forbidden as high school dances. Some of the parents in all grades object to dancing and for this reason they are forbidden as high school or class dances. But if the pupils give them independently and report them as high school dances, the faculty nor the board of education have no jurisdiction over them and can only object to their being reported as given by the high school.

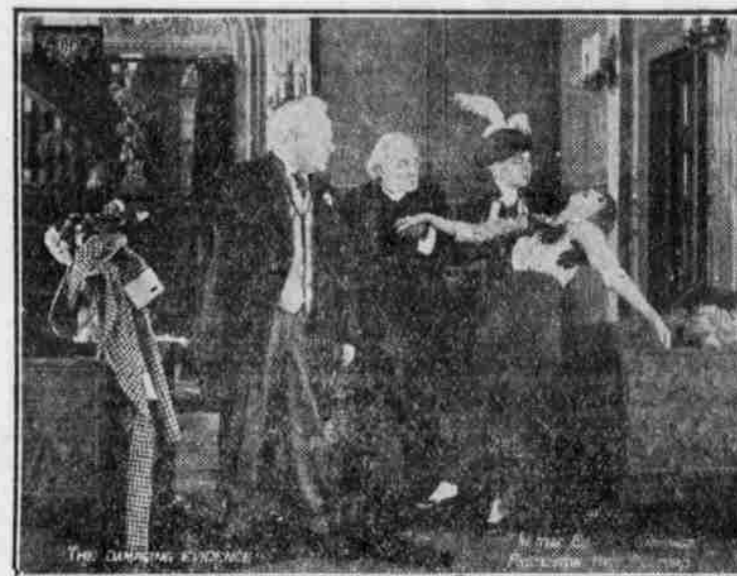

Files Intervention Petition.

County Attorney Geo. N. Gibbs filed a petition of intervention last week in the district court in the estate matter of the late Wm. D. Lyle who died here about five years ago. At the time of the death no heirs could be found and the administrator of the estate was appointed. Shortly after this some alleged heirs appeared from Scotland and attempted to claim the estate. Trial was held here and the jury decided that the heirs were illegal and the case was carried to the supreme court. It was returned from that court and sent here for a new trial. The county attorney filed the petition whereby the estate will escheat to the state on account of no legal heirs being found. The estate amounts to about \$6,000.

The case of Harvey I. Babcock vs. William D. Fisher was up for hearing Saturday morning before Judge Grant and was continued until March 13. Mr. Babcock is administrator of the estate of the late W. K. Green, and is suing for the recovery of a promissory note alleged to be due the estate by the defendant.
