Fire Damages Firemen's Headquarters.

A bad fire broke out shortly before 10 o'clock Wednesday evening in the back rooms over the Hinman garage in the rooms occupied by the firemen. The back room where the firemen's trap door is located was practically gutted by the flames. All the rooms above the garage were more or less damaged by smoke and the fire spread some into one of the other back rooms.

Just how the fire was started is not known and some contend that it started from defective electric wiring, but indications would show that it started in the bed in the room. The bed was first to burn and all the bed clothes and slats were burned. It is also reported that some of the men were in the rooms a few minutes before the fire was discovered and that they were lying on the bed smoking. The room was in flames before the fire was discovered and one of the men in the garage smelled the burning wood and turned in the alarm.

The department was called at once and attempted to go up the front stairs and apply the chemicals but were unable to do so on account of the smoke. Water was then turned on the flames both from the front and the rear, some of the men fighting from the roof of the back room of the garage. A large crowd gathered to watch the fire and from the amount of smoke it was thought to be much more dangerous fire than it proved out to be.

The need of a paid regular fire department is strongly emphasized in this. That a fire can start and get under headway enough to cause so much damage in tee very rooms occupied by the firemen is a deplorable fact. A regular department would be much more careful and guard against fire in their own rooms, as well as be on the job in case a fire broke out. Then too, they would be trained to fight the flames and would be able to work more systematically.

Receives Part of Radium.

Dr. D. T. Quigley has received the first of his instruments to be used in the radium treatment which he has recently added to his office equipment. The instrument is a small affair, the face of it measuring only one-half inch each way, and contains ten milligrams of the radium bromide. The cost of the one instrument was \$600, and since he made the contract for it the price has raised until now the same instrument would cost \$950. The radium will be used in the treatment of cancer, malignant growths, neuritis, rheumatism and skin diseases and it is very powerful for this treatment.

The doctor demonstrated Tuesday evening to a number of men the power of radium. It will penetrate any metal and it requires three inches of lead to screen it off and even then some will penetrate through. The radium is fixed on a square base with a lead back and is covered with varnish so that it will not work too strongly. In the demonstration the doctor gave the instrument behind a stove lid and it shined through very brightly. The illuminating power is much greater by night on account of the conflicting rays of the sun.
