Railroad Notes

Thomas Watts, formerly deputy sheriff here was visiting friends in the city Sunday evening. He is now located at Grand Island where he has a position in the secret service of the Union Pacific.

Geo. R. Smith, late of this city, who had been filling the position of trainmaster at Sidney, has resigned, and with his family left last week for Denver where they will make their future home.

Ben C. Davis, a Union Pacific fireman out of this city, was quite seriously injured last week at Julesburg, Colo. He started to climb down from his engine to take on water and the steps were slippery and he slipped off and fell to the ground. He strained his thigh in some manner that will necessitate his laying off for several days.

A. L. Parks, machinist helper at the new round house, fell off one of the boilers Friday morning and bruised his heel very severely. He was working on top of one of the boilers and slipped and fell a distance of about fifteen feet to the cement floor. All his weight struck on his right foot and he was fortunate in not being hurt much worse than he was. He will be off for two or three weeks.
