New Well at Station.

F. S. Bible of Paxton, made an irrigation well at the experimental sub-station this week. The well is located near the new office building. A hole six feet in diameter was dug to the sheet water which is 20 feet below the surface. Then a blind "boiler iron" casing 26 inches in diameter was sunk in the center of the hole to bed-rock 23 feet. A galvanized iron casing 22 inches in diameter was set inside the 26-inch casing. The lower 12 feet of this casing are made of galvanised iron wire No. 105. The perforations amount to 70 per cent of the surface of the casing. The top half of the casing is blind.
