## Talk of Building

### New Court House

W. C. Lewman, architect and builder of the new court house that was recently completed at Lexington, was in the city yesterday afternoon in conference with the county commissioners and a number of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Lewman had with him the plans of the Lexington building and showed figures as to the cost of construction.

The county commissioners and a few of the boosters of the city made a visit to Lexington a short time ago for the purpose of looking it over. At that time it was not quite complete, but the men brought home a favorable report on the efficiency of such a building for Lincoln county.

The matter has been taken up with the Chamber of Commerce and plans are being made for a get-together mass meeting to be held in the near future, at which time the question of a new court house for this county will be widely discussed. At this proposed meeting, men from all parts of the county will be invited and the matter will be taken in hand with the object in view of getting a new building here. The old building is entirely inadequate to meet the needs of the county and several of the county officials are obliged to have offices in other buildings, which makes a continual expense for the county.

### New Well at Station.

F. S. Bible of Paxton, made an irrigation well at the experimental substation this week. The well is located near the new office building. A hole six feet in diameter was dug to the sheet water which is 20 feet below the surface. Then a blind "boiler iron" casing 26 inches in diameter was sunk in the center of the hole to bed-rock 23 feet. A galvanized iron casing 22 inches in diameter was set inside the 26-inch casing. The lower 12 feet of this casing are made of galvanized iron wire No. 105. The perforations amount to 70 per cent of the surface of the casing. The top half of the casing is blind. After the permanent casing was in place coarse gravel was poured between the two casings; the outer casing was drawn out as the gravel was being put in. A casing 4 feet in diameter was sunk 3 feet into the surface water and 3 feet of the inner casing removed. This gave space for submerging the centrifugal pump.
