

Sprague Pleads Guilty.

Joseph Sprague, who appeared in the county court last week on the charge of fornication, appeared before Judge H. M. Grimes in chamber session of district court Saturday afternoon and entered a plea of guilty. He raceived sentence of \$50 fine and three months in the county jail. The maximum sentence for this offence is six months in jail of \$100 fine or both.

After several attempts to secure a satisfactory water for ice-making, Hawley & Lowe have been successful, this strata having been found at a depth of about 145 feet. The water comes from the same strata found on the Moody place several blocks east, and is free of alkaline and has less solids than either the city water or other water that comes from a greater depth. During the winter Hawley & Lowe made a number of improvements to their plant, and it is now running very smoothly and turning out a su perfor quality of ice. They are now fitting up three refrigerating rooms which will be leased by local parties, and this fall expect to construct a 1000-ton warehouse for ice storage. With this latter addition it will be possible to keep the plant in operation in winter as Well as summmer.


