## Road Case a Hard Fight.

A petition for the changing of road No. 240, located in Fox Creek vicinity was brought before the county commissioners yesterday and they granted the petition with a few changes. N. F. House and Alvin Feather appeared for the petitioners and R. L. Ryan and Thomas Peterson appeared with a remonstrance against changing the road as petitioned. Attorney M. E. Crosby appeared for the remonstrators.

The case was hard fought and the controversy was over changing the road into the canyon or leaving it to run on top of the hill. Mr. Ryan conceded that the road in Fox Creek canyon would take up too much of his hay meadow and that on the hill it would accommodate more people and give better satisfaction. The petitioners contended that the hill road would make too hard a pull for teams.
