Alleged Burglar Caught at Kearney.

Sheriff A. J. Salisbury returned Sunday evening from Kearney where he went Sunday morning to bring home a man suspected of the burglary of the hardware store and cleaning establishment here Thursday night. The man refused to give his name, but the evidence against him is quite strong.

He was taken in on suspicion by the Tuffalo county sheriff Saturday night. He had been seen around there for some time and it was discovered that he had sold two apparently new revolvers. When taken he had the other three and they are of the same make as the ones stolen from here last week.

Complaint was filed yesterday in the county court by Sheriff Salisbury and the hearing will probably be held some time today.

Arrested for Horse Stealing.

Earl Inman was arrested yesterday upon a warrant issued from the county court on the charge of stealing a horse. Michael Gleason filed complaint against him and in it he alleges that on June 4th Inman stole a buckskin horse of him of the value of \$50.
