Runaway Is Taken Sick

A 17-year-old boy, giving his name as Vance Strouse, stopped in the city Wednesday at the office of one of the local physicians complaining that he was sick. Upon examination it was found that he had the symptoms of typhoid fever and that he was in a serious condition. Dr. T. J. Kerr took him and after giving him some medicine sent him to a local hospital for treatment.

The boy was penniless and stated that he had run away from his home in Toledo, Ohio and had gone to Rawlins, Wyo., with a cousin. He got tired of the wanderer's life and was on his return home when he was taken sick. He stated that he had written home but that he had not stayed in one place long enough to hear from his parents. His parents were notified and he was given care at the hospital until it could be ascertained as to whether or not he was taking down with typhoid fever.
