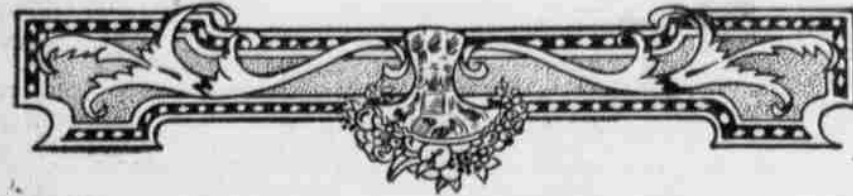

Jefferson Richards, residing sixteen miles south of the city, died Wednesday at his home of dropsy. He has been a resident of this county for several years and is well known to many. He was fifty-nine years old at the time of his death.
