

T. R. Will be Named in 1916
By Republicans, as He Expects,
Says Mondell, "Standpatter"

(From The Washington Post.)
"I don't think any one doubts that Theodore Roosevelt expects to obtain the republican nomination for the presidency in 1916. Furthermore, I don't think there is much question but that he can have it if he wants it," said Representative Frank W. Mondell, of Wyoming, one of the standpat leaders of the house, yesterday.

"How large a part of the Republican party of those people whom Roosevelt has attacked most viciously will refuse to receive Col. Roosevelt back?" Mr. Mondell was asked. "None," he replied. "I think Col. Roosevelt will do what he can for a few progressive candidates in some states. I don't think he will make the active campaign he might have made had the trouble been of more recent origin."

"I don't think you will find Col. Roosevelt saying anything which will widen the closing breach between him and the republican party. I suppose he will continue to attack the individuals he singled out before, but the party generally, I believe, will not be the object of his attack. The democratic party will be his target."

But how can Col. Roosevelt, who declared time and time again that the differences between him and the republican party were fundamental, reconcile these statements with a return to the fold now or two years hence?"

"Well, Col. Roosevelt will come back to a slightly different party," replied Mr. Mondell. "The leaders of the party, and the party generally, realize that they have been severely punished, and that perhaps not altogether by political malcontents. They have come to understand that among those who followed Col. Roosevelt out of the party were a great many clear thinking citizens, firmly grounded in republican principles, who believed, and still believe, that the party had fallen into a rut, is not sympathetic to the progressive tho't of the time, and not sensible to the demands and needs of the people."

"The party leaders realize that the party cannot afford to lose this type of supporters, and that it can bring them back into the fold by adopting a course more nearly in accord with their views."

"In other words, Col. Roosevelt will return to a chastened party. No doubt certain reforms will be exacted by him as the price of peace and will be agreed to, but he will find that he is still a republican, and his progressive followers will find that they are, if they ever were, still republicans, and the republican party reunited will present the strong front to the enemy in 1915 that it presented before 1912."

ACTING CHAIRMAN ELDER ISSUES CONVENTION CALL

The Republican of Lincoln county, Neb., are hereby called to meet in mass convention at the court house in North Platte on the 25th day of July, 1914, for the purpose of electing thirteen delegates to attend the state convention at Lincoln to be held Tuesday, July 28th, 1914, and for the purpose of transacting such other business as may come before the convention. It is further recommended that the several precincts of the county hold their precinct caucuses on Monday July 20th, for the purpose of electing a precinct committeeman and nominating a precinct ticket. In order to get the names of those nominated for precinct officers on the official ballot it is necessary to certify them to the county clerk. I would further recommend that those that were elected as precinct committeemen attend the county convention for the reason that it will be necessary for the county committee to elect a chairman immediately after the convention, and the law provides that the county committee elect the chairman.
