Independents Lose to Ogalalla. The Ogalalla aggregation defeated the Independents at Ogalalla Tuesday afternoon by the score of 3 to 1, the same score as the first game. The game was lost on errors, Ogalalla not having an earned run. F. Sandall brought across the one run for North Platte. He went to first on a single and was advanced to second by a sacrifice by Duncan. A Sandall then came up and lined out a good clean hit, scoring F. Sandall.

Three different times the North Platte boys had a chance to tie the score when they had a man on second and one on third, but they were not hitting and the men were left on the bases. Three errors by Pierce, two by Pass, one by Rinker and one by McClure let in the scores for Ogalalla. A change in the lineup was made and the team was strengthened somewhat by the change, but some other changes will be made in the near future. Harold Langford was put in at short-stop and Halligan was put in the field. Langford played a good game and with a little more experience will make a good man.

McClure pitched an excellent game allowing three hits and striking out seven men. Marrott allowed five hits and struck out ten men. North Platte totaled seven errors and Ogalalla only three. Bailey, a pitcher of Grant, was umpire.

The case of Maurice J. O'Connell vs. Thomas J. Long for the collection of a reward offered the first of the year by the defendant was tried Tuesday in the county court and the judge decided in favor of the plaintiff. From the evidence it seems that Mr. Long offered a reward of twenty-five dollars for the arrest and conviction of any person who furnished intoxicating liquor to his son, Ed Long. The son was "spiked" at the saloons, but he got liquor through other parties. O'Connell caused the arrest and convicted one Will Hunt of the crime and alleged that when he applied for the reward the defendant refused to pay it.

A case was filed in the county court Tuesday afternoon by Walter Fulk and John A. Fulk against Maible W. Turpin, Frank Turpin and Neal Turpin. The case is for the collection of \$750 damages with interest and costs which the plaintiffs allege to be due them for injury to a wheat crop they had sowed. They claim that a tract of land was leased by the defendants in the year 1912 for a term of three years and that they had a sub-lease and that in the fall of 1913, they, with the advisement of the defendants, sowed seventy-five acres of fall wheat which they were to raise on shares. That early in the year 1914 the defendants leased the ground to other parties and that the other parties disced up the wheat and left them with no crop.
