Hitchcock Favors Deep Well Project.

Word was received this morning from Senator Hitchcock announcing that he would lend all his support to the amendment to the sundry bill appropriation bill, which is now in conference in the United States congress, for the appropriation of \$100,000 to the geological survey to carry on boring wells and making other experiments in the great plains area to find if there is artesian water.

This matter was taken up some time ago and passed the senate, but the house turned it down and it went into conference. The bill was introduced by Senator Norris. If it should pass it will mean a great deal to the semi-arid section east of the mountains as tests will be made to find if there is artesian water in paying quantities for irrigation or deep water that can be pumped profitably. In all probability it will pass and the experiments will be made. Should artesian water, gas or oil be found it would benefit the entire country and for this reason the federal government should take the matter in hand. While on the other hand, if the project should prove a failure it would benefit many as it would save individuals and small companies the expense of making these tests in a futile attempt to find if such conditions exist.

War Now On.

Actual hostilities between Austria and Serbia have begun and today's papers announce that two battles are in progress near Belgrade. A half million Austro-Hungarian soldiers are reported on Serbian soil. Russia is mobilizing its forces and Germany has sent a note to Russia demanding an explanation of its intentions with regard to such mobilization, the apparent object being to support Serbia, in which event a clash between Russia and Germany will occur. Stock markets everywhere in Europe have virtually ceased operations and the leading banking institutions have taken measures to preserve their stocks of gold. All Europe is on high tension, and the complications there are reflected in the markets of the United States, cotton slumping four dollars a bale yesterday and stocks on the New York market going down from five to seventeen points.

Hershey Replies

The North Platte Tribune attributes the failure of the Hershey Giants in showing up for a game yesterday on their grounds with the Independents to "cold feet." Let's see, the Giants played the Independents at North Platte July 8th and were defeated by only one score. Since then the Independents have been giving all sorts of promises for a return game here but failed to set any date. Now they want another game down there. Wouldn't that jar you—and because the Giants fall to enrich the pockets of that bunch by playing every game down there, they've got "cold feet." The Independents have been guaranteed \$20 for a game here, he same as they gave our boys down there, so why don't they come here? That's fair—but where does that leave the cold feet—or brain fever? Wouldn't it tickle you to see our farmer boys beat that salaried bunch?—Hershey Times.

WHEAT SLUMP IS COSTING FARMERS

Nebraska wheat farmers have lost an average of \$170, each, a year by the slump in the price of wheat since the republican party went out of power. All the Nebraska wheat farmers put together have lost \$10,930,000 a year. Recent hot debates in the house of representatives led to an investigation of wheat prices. The results of this investigation are now given out for the first time. The figures given are right up to July 1. They reveal a general slump of fifteen cents a bushel in wheat prices since republican times.

There are 64,322 wheat reporting farmers in Nebraska, whose estimated wheat production this year was 73,200,000 bushels. The figures show the average wheat farmer throughout the country has lost \$95.00 a year through the decrease in the price of his wheat from what it was under republican times. The loss to the farmers of the whole United States is \$129,500,000 a year. The total estimated wheat production of the country for this year is 930,000,000 bushels, from reports from 1,458,867 wheat farmers.
