The War Game
The Belgian consul admits that ten Liege forts have fallen. The German troops are occupying the town of Liege, but not all of the surrounding forts.

The French and German armies are lining up for a general battle and indications are that Alsace will be the scene of the first general engagement.

The full levy of fighters between the ages of twenty and fifty has been made by Germany. This gives that country a fighting force of nine million men.

Six hundred German spies have been arrested in Belgium, one hundred of whom have been shot.

Paris reports that Austrian troops have fallen back before the Serbians on the Bosnian frontier.

Ships reaching New York report hearing wireless messages that the North German Lloyd steamer Kronprinz Wilhelm had been captured by the British cruiser Essex.

Activities in Japan indicate that country is to get into the war game as an ally of England.

England denies loss of war vessels by German Sub-marine boats.

Germany is concentrating troops on the Russian frontier and fighting in that section is early anticipated.

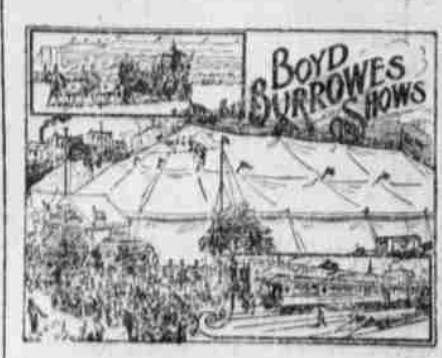
