WILL ATTEMPT TO GET \$100,000 APPROPRIATION

Word was received this week from Congressman Kinkaid announcing that the Nebraska congressmen as well as some of those from other states were still attempting to get a bill through to have congress appropriate \$100,000 for the purpose of experimenting in the great plains area for artesian water or underflow sufficient to pump profitably for irrigation purposes. Congressman Kinkaid announces that the amendment was stricken out of the Sundry Civil bill, but he stated that they are still doing their best to secure it in another appropriation bill. "In fact," he states, "we have been working diligently in behalf of this appropriation, but so far without success, most all of his session, all the house members."

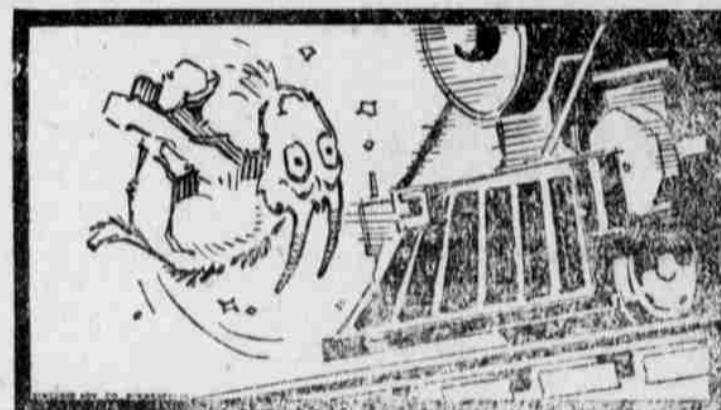
