## MISSIS GANTT AND COX LEAD FOR COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT

Indications of the primary election which was held Tuesday tend to show Miss Aileen Gantt and Miss Blanche Cox leading respectively on the republican and democratic tickets. The full count has not yet been made, but the unofficial count that has been ascertained thus far shows them far in the lead.

For county judge, Geo. E. French is far in the lead, with Leslie Baskins and William Beatty running close for second. The vote was comparatively light all over the county. Parties bringing in the returns failed to give the unofficial count and for this reason the running of the other candidates cannot be estimated.

County Clerk Yost will start today on the canvass of the ballots and it will be some time before the official count will be made. A number of democratic ballots were cast on which were written names of men who had not filed for office and there is a question as to the validity of such nomination. County Attorney Gibbs has taken the matter up with the attorney general to ascertain whether or no candidates can be nominated in that manner. According to the returns thus far it would show that Joe Larsen had been nominated on the democratic ticket for county clerk and J. R. White for treasurer, two offices for which the democrats had no candidates in the field.

**Court House Levy Defeated.**  
The proposition to levy \$100,000 in four annual levies for the purpose of erecting a new court house, was defeated at the Tuesday primary by several hundred votes, the exact result not yet being obtainable. The proposition carried in North Platte by 530 majority, but this was insufficient to overcome the majorities against the proposition in the outside precincts. Of the precincts from which returns have been received, only one outside precinct—Hinman—gave a majority in favor of the levy. A number of the precincts voted practically solid against the levy.

The following shows the way in which some of the precincts voted on the proposition: Brady, 36 for and 35 against; Cottonwood, 14 for and 19 against; Dickens, 2 for and 32 against; Jeffrey, 3 for and 21 against; Gaslin, 1 for and 17 against; Hall, 12 for and 15 against; Maxwell, 19 for and 45 against; Rosedale, 4 for and 7 against; Nichols, 28 for and 48 against; Payne, 3 for and 39 against; Osgood, 7 for and 10 against; Nowell, 6 for and 9 against.

Word was received here this morning by Dave Sheedy announcing that there was a severe cyclone last night at Harvard and that several people were killed and injured. The message stated that Mrs. Dunn Lavy, wife of Mrs. Sheedy's brother, was among the dead. Particulars of the accident causing her death were not given.

John Boyle, of the Birdwood section, was a business visitor in the city today, transacting business at the court house. He announces that the crops in his country are in fine shape and that they are expecting a big harvest. The corn, he says, is fired in some localities, but is not in bad condition. He stated that they have had plenty of water for irrigation purposes except for the few days that the state engineer ordered all the gates closed.

Mr. Smith has had charge of the playgrounds here this summer and his work has been much appreciated. The work has been started and it is hoped that in the future it will be carried on permanently. Jay Smith will accompany Mr. and Mrs. Smith home and will attend school in Negaunee this year.

**Quick Work**  
On the night of July 19, 1870, an orderly awoke General Von Moltke, chief of the German imperial war staff and told him Napoleon III had declared war on Germany. Von Moltke directed the orderly to open the second drawer on the left hand side of his desk for complete instructions to mobilize the German armies. Then he went to sleep again. When he awoke troops had been on the march for two hours, in accordance with the orders in that drawer.

The German ambassador at St. Petersburg at 7:30 o'clock on Saturday evening, August 1, 1914, handed to the Russian minister of foreign affairs a declaration of war. When the council of ministers in Paris the same day was informed that Germany had declared war against Russia, it met President Poincare hurriedly at the Elysee palace. It was announced at once that the mobilization of the French army would begin at midnight and would be completed at 1:59 Sunday night, August 2.

## BASE BALL TOURNAMENT FOR CHURCH LEAGUE

A baseball tournament is being arranged in which the teams from the different churches will participate. The tournament is planned for next week and the men in charge are now working out a schedule of games. It will be an elimination contest and as fast as one team is defeated it will be dropped out of the contest. Six teams will probably participate and they will be as follows: Episcopal, Lutheran, Christian, Methodist, Baptist and Catholic.

The games will be played in the evening, called at six o'clock. Rules will be formulated under which each team must enter and play and all teams will be required to observe these rules. The tournament is to decide the supremacy of the church teams and the members of the different teams will be obliged to qualify as being eligible. Horton Munger is at the head of the committee on arrangements and the managers are asked to get their information from him.

**Summary of the War Situation**  
There is good reason to believe that a serious engagement, in which the German advance is opposed by troops of Belgium and France, has been going on since Monday, south of Brussels. No definite news of the progress of this encounter, however, has been received.

An official communication from the Russian general staff at St. Petersburg says the Russian mobilization is now completed and that eleven members of the Russian imperial family are at the front.

It is rumored persistently at The Hague that the German crown prince Frederick William, has been seriously wounded at the front and that Emperor William has hastened to the side of his son, who is said to be at Aix La Chappelle.

Dispatches from London, delayed by the British censors, announce officially the landing of the British expeditionary forces on the French coast. Field Marshal Sir John French, the British commander in chief, was given a rousing reception in Paris. The British army in France is believed to number between 100,000 and 120,000 men.

The Servian premier is authority for the statement that Austrian forces have suffered a serious defeat on the Servian line. He telegraphs London that fifteen thousand Austrians have been "annihilated" near Sabac, whence they fled in disorder. The Servians captured fourteen Austrian guns.

Two German cruisers, evidently seriously disabled in an encounter with the enemy, have been brought into Hong Kong. The censorship maintained at this British port in China prevents the sending of the vessels' names or any details of the engagement which preceded their capture.


