## EXHIBITS COMING IN WITH A RUSH

### COUNTY FAIR OPENS TODAY AND INDICATIONS POINT TO A BIG DISPLAY OF PRODUCE

Hinman and Sellers Precincts are the First to Place Exhibits, Each Making a Varied Display of Grain, Vegetables and Grasses.

This is the opening day of the Lincoln county fair, and when evening comes the floor, the stage and every corner of the big Lloyd opera house will be filled with the products of Lincoln county farms, the handiwork of women and exhibits of the city and rural schools. The display will be a most varied one, and after viewing it, one must conclude that he lives in a favored country even though rain does not fall as frequently as we desire.

All day yesterday Secretary Sebastian and his assistant were kept busy receiving exhibits, and a dozen men and women were employed in arranging and placing them. The first collective exhibits to arrive were from Hinman precinct, Sellers precinct and the state farm. These are very comprehensive and include everything the soil produces in this latitude. The Hinman precinct exhibit also includes the work of Platte Valley school pupils. There are many individual exhibits, and these are being increased in numbers as the hours pass.

On the stage is the display of women's needle work, which is very extensive, and there is a very liberal display of paintings and hand painted china on the west side of the hall. In this section is also found the work of the pupils of the North Platte schools. The display of apples and other fruits have not been placed at this writing, but they will be on exhibition later in the day.

In the south end of the gallery has been fitted up a cozy rest room by the woman's suffrage committee. Everybody is welcome to visit this department as often as they wish and stay as long as they please.

Up to this morning the exhibits of live stock at the brick livery barn was light. It is expected, however, that a number of entries will be made today.

The poultry exhibit is strong, nearly every strain of chickens being represented. There are also several good pens of ducks, geese and guinea fowl and one or two pens of rabbits.

Exhibits are coming in much more rapidly today than yesterday, and it is probable that every available inch of display space will be occupied.

#### Notes

Sellers precinct, where they go over 200 feet to water, has an exhibit that is exceptionally fine. Thirty different varieties of wild grasses are shown in addition to all kinds of farm produce.

Entries are being made this forenoon for the better babies contest. This will be an important feature of the fair.

At one time this forenoon ten wagons were in front of the opera house unloading exhibits.

The band will give concerts at the hall at 1:30 this afternoon and at seven this evening.

One of the attractive exhibits in the poultry department are the rare birds shown by one of the Simon brothers.

With their exhibits of fancy work, paintings, ceramic work and cookery goods, the ladies play an important part in the fair. They have the Tribune's consent to the ballot.

### BURGLARS ROB TWO STORES SATURDAY AND SUNDAY

Two stores were robbed some time between Saturday evening and Monday morning and the officers are on the lookout for the robbers. Property that can be identified was taken from the North Side hardware store and the Loudon grocery store on the north side was also robbed of merchandise.

Facts would tend to show that the same robber or robbers did the three jobs that were done over Sunday. All three have the appearance of being done by a man that was not an amateur at the job.

The hardware store was entered from the rear window and was robbed of five revolvers, some ammunition, two razors, two flashlights and other small articles. The money drawer was also opened, but they failed to find very much there. A marked nickel that was in the drawer was left by the robber. Tracks discovered yesterday morning would tend to show that the robbery was committed Sunday night, as otherwise the foot prints would have been washed away.

The Loudon grocery store was entered Saturday night and several articles were taken. The robbers confined their plunder at that place mostly to tobacco, although some other articles were missing. Every possible search is being made for the robber and officers from all around have been cautioned to be on the lookout for men wishing to dispose of revolvers or razors.

The robbery of the hardware store some time ago was traced down and the man identified by means of the revolvers he had with him.
