BOLD BURGLAR ENTERS DR. McCABE'S HOME

TURNS ON NEARLY ALL LIGHTS IN THE HOUSE, AND THEN HIDES THE DOCTOR'S CLOTHES OF NEARLY HUNDRED DOLLARS.

An early morning burglar of very unusual habits entered the home of Dr. McCabe Sunday morning at about four o'clock and succeeded in getting away with nearly a hundred dollars in money and the doctor's annual pass. Night Officer Jones was called there about four-thirty, but the man had left no clue to his identity.

Dr. McCabe was awakened by the light shining in his face and as he woke up he heard his wife caution him to remain quiet for there was a burglar in the house. He looked up just in time to see the man go out of the door of his room and descend the stairs. Nearly every light in the house had been turned on and the burglar seemed to have taken no precaution from making it known that he was in the house.

The doctor got up and started in pursuit of the man and when he got out in the hall where the light had been turned off he discovered that the man had put a chair at the head of the stairs and had piled clothing around, so that anyone pursuing him would fall and give him a chance to get away. He had taken the doctor's clothes out into the hall and had gone through his pockets and secured about eighty-seven dollars in money, a check for ten dollars and the annual pass.

No clue to the man's identity is known other than that Dr. McCabe saw that he was a man of about five feet six inches in height and of medium build.

LOCALS TAKE THREE FROM SCOTTS BLUFF

Win Saturday's Game by Score of Seven to One, and Both Games Sunday by Scores of Twelve to Five and Seven to Two.

The North Platte team took three straight games from the Scotts Bluff team Saturday and Sunday. The visitors had been heralded as a strong and winning team, but they were outclassed when pitted against the local team. The locals had been strengthened somewhat by the addition of Brown, a pitcher from Butte, Mont., Platt a new outfielder, and Holliday who caught one game Sunday. Vance pitched Saturday's game and held the visitors down to three hits and struck out eight men, while the Scotts Bluff pitcher was touched up for thirteen hits.

Brown pitched the first game Sunday and gave nine safeties, while North Platte took eleven safe ones. In this game Scotts Bluffs was credited with ten errors.

Jones pitched the second game and kept the visitors down to five hits, while North Platte took eleven. The attendance at Saturday's game was light, but the Sunday attendance was good.

The North Platte line up was stronger than usual, and with the same line up ought to win both games scheduled for this week.

A Day to Be Observed

On August 24, 1814, the British under command of General Ross took possession of Washington, D. C., then a city of 9,000 and burned the capitol and other buildings. General Ross, with his British troops pursued the few marines and volunteers toward the city of Baltimore and in the assault on Fort M'Henry on September 13th General Ross was killed. Francis Scott Key, a young attorney, was arrested and threatened execution on an English frigate during the bombardment of Ft. M'Henry. The heavy guns on the English vessels continued until after twelve o'clock at midnight, and so long as the cannon boomed Key knew that the fort was holding out. It was a long time to wait for dawn, and straining his eyes through the early morning mist he saw the stars and stripes still floating. He drew from his pocket an old letter on the back of which he wrote what is now our national air, "The Star Spangled Banner."

This was on September 14, 1814, soon to be one hundred years ago.

North Platte should make a proper observance of the day, as will be done in every large town and city. The first object that greets the eye on the morning of September 14th should be a flag flying from every pole in the city.

War News

A French report says: "Our force found near Nancy on a front of three kilometers 2,500 dead Germans, and near Vitrimont, along a front of four kilometers 4,500. Longwy where the garrison consisted of only one battalion, has capitulated after a siege of twenty-four days."

The French and British are gathering every man and gun available in northwestern France in an attempt to stop the German advance on the road to Paris.

A dispatch to the Daily News from Rotterdam says that out of 60,000 inhabitants of Malines only 200 are now left in the town. Refugees state that many were killed by the bombardment and practically all of the rest fled.

It is officially announced in Paris, says a dispatch, that the military governor has ordered all residents of the zone within action of the city's defending forts to evacuate and destroy their houses within four days from today, August 30.

The British and French governments are calling upon all Englishmen and Frenchmen to join in defense of the allied lines, which apparently are being pushed back by the overwhelming German forces on their way to Paris. A campaign has been begun in London and other English cities to induce all able-bodied Englishmen to join the colors. Field Marshal Lord Roberts, addressing a meeting to obtain recruits for the army, declared the country was in great danger and that defeat would mean "ruin, shame and slavery." Field Marshal M'urthen said any eligible man refusing to join the army in the time of his country's need is nothing but a coward.

Dispatches from Austrian headquarters to the Corriere Della Sera state that 1,000,000 men are engaged in the great battle that has been proceeding for three days on the Austro-Russian frontier. The battle line extends from the Vistula river to the Dnieper river, over 100 miles. The fighting has been fully as severe as that in Belgium. The Russians, who took the offensive, have penetrated over twenty miles into Austrian territory.
