A dispatch from Berlin says that the number of prisoners of war now in Germany is about 200,000. these prisoners are 1830 Russian officers and 91,400 privates; 440 Bel-gian officers and 30,200 Belgian privates; and 160 English officers and 7,350 privates. The captives include twoc ommanding generals of the Frence army, two commanding genals of lesser rank of the Russian army and the Belgian commandant at Liege.
