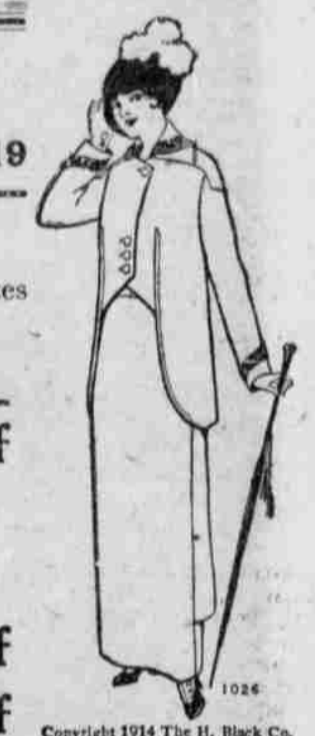

That the fumes also cause much inconvenience for his patrons and that at times they force his patrons to leave before they have seen the performance.

German Hold Many Prisoners.
A dispatch from Berlin says that the number of prisoners of war now in Germany is about 299,000. Among these prisoners are 1839 Russian officers and 91,400 privates; 440 Belgian officers and 39,200 Belgian privates; and 160 English officers and 7,350 privates. The captives include two commanding generals of the France army, two commanding generals of lesser rank of the Russian army and the Belgian commandant at Liege.
