CHURCH MEN TO ORGANIZE

Object is to Unionize Efforts for the Betterment of the City Churches.

Plans are on foot for a union meeting of all the church men of the city to be held some time next week at which it is hoped that some arrangement can be made to unionize the efforts of the church men and get them on a working basis for the betterment of all the churches of the city.

This movement has sprung out of the base ball league of the churches and it has been the general opinion that it was to be for the ball players alone. However, it is to go deeper than that and is to take in all of the church men of the city, who wish to become members.

No definite plans of the meeting have yet been made, but it is the intention of the men having it in charge to make this a permanent organization, having as its aim the betterment of the churches and the unionizing of efforts among men.

RAILROAD NOTES

Notice to Water Consumers.

In order to get water bills ready by October 1st our meter readers will start reading meters on Monday, September 21st. As the discount period is so short and so many of our customers forget to bring their bills we have decided to try a new method. Instead of mailing the bills as formerly they will be kept in the office and in their place the meter reader will leave a slip giving the water rates and also the last and present readings of the meter, from which the consumer can obtain the amount of water used and what the bill will be. This will save the water department about \$10.00 in postage and save considerable time in the office making out duplicate bills. Bills will be mailed to business men and non-residents as formerly so they can mail us their checks with bills. To obtain discount all checks must be mailed to reach the water office not later than the 10th of October.

Our meter readers are instructed and expected to be courteous and the Water Commissioner would appreciate it if consumers will let him know of any case where meter reader is saucy or discourteous in any way.

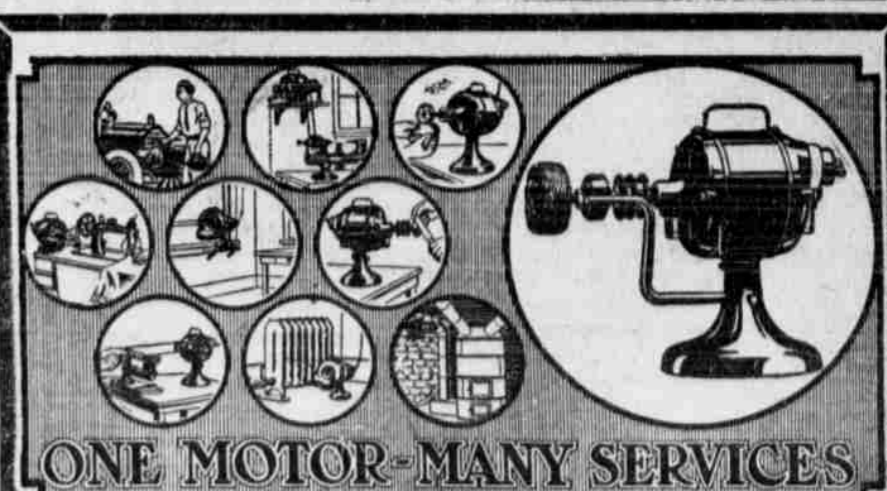
