GRIDIRON ARTISTS ARE GETTING IN FINE TRIM

Back Field is Light But Fast and Line is Heavy as Ever—Schedule of Games for Season.

The 1914 high school football team is fast rounding into form and the prospects for a winning team this season are the best they have ever been. Coaches Neville and Keefe announce that they have the best bunch of material to work with this year they have ever had and that it is showing up in excellent shape.

Practice has been steadily going since the first week of school and the boys are now beginning to get the old machine work which characterizes a real football team. A few minor injuries have been reported, but nothing of a serious nature at all. A number of the veterans of last year are back in the game, but Baker and White are both barred this year on account of health. Baker is just recovering from an attack of typhoid and White, the fast sub-quarter back of last year, is not strong and is keeping out on the doctor's advice.

The line this year is exceptionally good and has on it a number of the old guard. Kelly and Vernon are both back and playing strong. The back field is a little light, but what it lacks in that respect is more than counterbalanced in speed and nerve. Cool, who played quarter back last season, is a star and Howe is also playing a fast game at half back. Boal and Stuart are trying for the position of full and both men are fast players. Loudin is holding down the position at quarter and with him in the back field they have a fast bunch.

A practice game will be played by the high school bunch Friday, September 25 against a number of the high school alumni. This will give the boys good experience and training in a real game before the opening of the season which will be October 2 when they will play Curtis on the local grounds. The schedule of games this year shows some good ones and the boys will have a chance of putting North Platte on the map when they play Omaha. In this game they will have a chance of comparison with some real teams in this state as well as with Chicago by the comparative score made.

The date November 20 will be left open on account of its being so close to Thanksgiving, but it will probably be filled up later.

Looks Favorable for Station.

Postmaster Davis has received a letter from the postoffice department in reply to the petition for the establishment of a postoffice sub-station at the Bowen drug store in the Fourth ward. This letter asks for additional data concerning the proposed station, and this is taken as an indication that the department looks with favor upon the proposition.

Postmaster Davis sent in the necessary data Saturday and also Mr. Bowen's agreement to act, and it will probably be only a short time until the office is established. The station will be located in the Northside drug store and will handle all business of the post office department with the exception of distributing mail.

The need of the station has long been evident and the establishment of the same will be a big benefit to the residents of that part of the city who are able to procure stamps, money orders, etc., without having to cross the tracks and come all the way over to town. The position as postmaster in the station carries only a nominal salary, the advantage being in bringing custom to the store where it is located. The government generally locates these stations in drug stores where possible for the reason that they are kept open more than other stores.

Postal Savings Pass \$10,000 Mark

Thursday of last week the postal savings deposits in the local postoffice passed the \$10,000 mark. The total of the amounts deposited here aggregated \$10,445 Saturday morning. This is a big increase over a few months ago when the deposits were less than \$5,000.

From all appearances the war in Europe has had considerable to do with the big increase as the numerous depositors the past few weeks when the big stamp has been made are mostly foreigners, a large number being Greeks and Italians. The reason is that they have been warned that the government was the only safe place for their money and they are depositing the limit in the postal savings.

The limited amount that is permitted to be deposited by each person has curtailed the deposits to a large extent as there are a number who have asked to deposit far over the amount allowed. The limit of deposits is one hundred dollars in one month and no depositor can have more than five hundred dollars on deposit at one time.

A large number of depositors have asked to deposit hundreds of dollars at a time and one main cause to the office with one thousand seven hundred dollars which he wished to deposit. This money if deposited is put into the banks again and allowed to be in circulation, while if they men are not allowed to deposit it they bury it and thus take it out of circulation.

Two large loads of Sears, Roebuck & Co. catalogues were received Saturday morning at the local postoffice. Three hundred and forty of the catalogues were for distribution in this city by the city carriers. In all there were over five hundred in the shipment and it was the largest load of mail received at this office for some time, each catalogue weighing five pounds. A number of the catalogues were for distribution through the general delivery, and a large number went out on the rural routes and five bags of them were addressed to Tryon.

PAROLED CONVICT ENJOYED THREE DAYS OF FREEDOM

A case was filed yesterday in the county court upon complaint of Deputy Sheriff Woods entitled the state of Nebraska vs. George Bishop. Bishop is charged with the theft of a suit of clothes valued at \$25, an automatic revolver valued at \$18 and \$15 in money, the property of Don Milton.

Bishop was released on parole only last year and was paroled to Mr. Milton. He had lived in his new home only two days. Sunday Mr. and Mrs. Milton left the house for a visit with neighbors and during their absence Bishop stole the goods and went to Wallace where he was apprehended by the deputy.

The Episcopal Guild will meet Thursday afternoon with Mrs. C. S. Clinton. There is much business to be transacted and all members are urged to be present and are asked to come prepared to work.

Every day for the past six weeks Mrs. Drayton, who lives three miles southwest of town, has marketed a load of melons. She had out five acres which were grown by pump irrigation. The melon crop has proved a paying one.

Another coast to coast pedestrian, the 'steenth' to pass through this season, arrived Sunday night and will remain for a few days. His name is Ralph Vegar, who started from New York City nearly four years ago and claims to have covered 56,000 miles. If he has covered this distance on foot it would mean an average of forty miles every day in the year for four years.

The painters and decorators in charge of the work on the federal building have announced to Postmaster Davis that they expect to finish their work on the inside decorating by September 30th. Before they are permitted to leave the job an inspector must be called and look over the work and pass judgment on it. They ask that Mr. Davis have the inspector here by that date so that they can leave as soon as the work is completed.
