JAP LOSES LIFE NEAR SUTHERLAND

TRIES TO FORD RIVER AND GOES
DOWN IN DEEP WATER.

Accident Happened Wednesday Above the New Sutherland Bridge—By-standers are Powerless to Aid.

Sisla Koakutsa, a Japanese farm hand who has been employed for some time on the Pizer ranch in the Sutherland vicinity, was drowned Wednesday afternoon while attempting to cross the Platte river a short distance above the new bridge at Sutherland. The horse which he was riding floundered when they struck deep water and hrew the man into the water.

Koakutsa and a number of other men were driving cattle across the river and he had fallen behind the rest. He attempted to cross in another place where the water is turned under the new bridge and struck a swift current which ranged from twelve to fifteen feet in depth. The horse became frightened and as near as can be told reared and fell backwards. The man sustained a bruise on his face and it is thought that the horse struck him and dazed him so that he was unable to get out.

The man stayed with the horse for some time but finally the horse went down and came up without the man and swam ashore. John Ritter, county bridge inspector, was the only eye witness to the accident and he was so far away that he could not get to the man. The current is so swift that diving for the lost man was impossible and the men had to wait until the body washed down stream and out on the sand.

He was in the water less than twenty minutes, but when he was taken out he was dead. W. R. Maloney, county coroner, was in that vicinity and he was called at once as was also a doctor from Sutherland, but when they arrived the doctor pronounced the man dead.

Koakutsa was twenty-nine years old and leaves no family in this country. He was unmarried. The funeral will be held this afternoon.

Odd Fellows Have Big Time

It was open to all the men for all night and two large washboilers filled with coffee were kept going all night over gasoline stoves. The men were given breakfast at the hotel in the morning and left Tryon about six o'clock for this city.
