LITTLE GIRL DRAGGED TO DEATH BY HORSE

WHILE RETURNING SATURDAY AFTERNOON FROM PARTY NORTH OF CITY.

Anna Jeanette Gaunt is Killed When Saddle Turns, Neck Broken and Chest Crushed in.

Anna Jeanette Gaunt was killed Saturday evening at the home of her grandfather, Will Gaunt, residing twelve miles northwest of the city, when the saddle turned on the horse which she was riding and she was dragged for a quarter of a mile. Her neck was broken and she was badly crushed about the upper part of the body.

The little girl had ridden to the Allen home about a half mile from the home of her grand parents to a party. She was returning with a neighbor boy and on the way home they had started a race. The saddle turned and let the little girl fall and her foot caught in the stirrup. This frightened the horse and it ran the remainder of the way home. It stopped at the barn and the child's grand mother noticed her lying there and ran out and picked her up. She lived for about an hour, but she did not regain consciousness. Her neck was broken, her right arm was broken in several places, and her chest was caved in. Her lower jaw and her nose were badly battered up. The horse had evidently kicked her all the way along as she was dragging by its side.

The little girl was rushed to the city for medical aid, but she did not live long. She was taken to the home of her uncle, Hugh Gaunt on north Locust street, and the funeral was held from there yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Dean Bowker officiating.

Anna Jeanette Gaunt was born Feb. 7, 1906 in this city and was the daughter of Will Gaunt, Jr. Three weeks after her birth her father was killed on the road. Her grandparents then took her to raise and have kept her since that time. She was eight years, eight months and ten days old at the time of her death. Her mother married again and is now Mrs. James Jensen, residing near here. Her grandparents were very much attached to her and held her more closely to their hearts than one of their own children as she was the sunshine of their lives in their old age. Mrs. Gaunt, the grand mother, was badly stricken and it was feared for some time that the shock would cause her death, or that she would lose her mind. She rather blamed herself for the child's death as she had allowed her to go. The other relatives, however, convinced her that it was inevitable and that she was in no way to blame and she is reported to be getting along as well as could be expected. She is in a rather critical condition.

Democrats Hold Meeting.
Richard L. Metcalfe, P. M. Whitehead, democratic candidates for state superintendent, and J. J. McCarthy, candidate for float representative on the democratic ticket, all spoke at the Lloyd opera house Friday evening in the interests of the democrats. Mr. Whitehead opened the meeting by telling some very funny (?) stories and he was followed by Mr. McCarthy. Mr. Metcalfe then gave a nice address of about an hour's duration. He stated that he had no abuse for the opposing candidates, but took up the task of proving the prowess of the candidates from his party elect. About one hundred were present.

Some More Tax.
Under the revenue bill that has passed the Congress each of the three picture shows in North Platte will pay a tax of \$25 per year, the Keith will pay \$50, each billiard hall will pay \$5 per year for each table used, and the bowling alley will pay \$5 for each alley. The local banks will be taxed one dollar on each thousand of capital, surplus and undivided profits, there will be a tax of one cent on each telegraph and telephone message, fifty cents on each deed of from \$100 to \$500 and fifty cents on each additional \$500, one cent on each dollar of fire insurance premium, and tax on all classes of drugs, a big increase on the tax of liquors and beer, and an increase on cigars and tobacco. In fact we will be compelled to pay "war taxes" when the country is in a state of peace—and why?
