Centering Efforts Against Miss Gantt

Satisfied that there is utterly no hope for the election of their candidates for county clerk, treasurer, sheriff and county commissioner, the democrats are centering their fight against Miss Gantt. That this is true, is evidenced by the fact that the Maxwell Telepost, supposed to be the democratic organ of the county, is boosting Miss Cox in each issue to the exclusion of boosts for the other democratic candidates. Evidently the democrats figure that one slice of bread from the loaf is better than none, but if surface indications can be accepted as worthy of consideration, the untimely will not even get the coveted slice. Miss Gantt is a Lincoln county young woman, the daughter of T. Fulton Gantt, one of the brainiest men that ever resided in the county, and with the exception of a few years residence in Lincoln while a student at the state university, has spent her life in North Platte. Her opponent is a comparative newcomer in the county; and when qualifications are equal if not superior, why not be loyal to Lincoln county and support with your vote a county-born young woman.

Miss Gantt's qualifications for the office cannot honestly be questioned; there is no requirements demanded of the county superintendent she cannot acceptably meet; her education, her experience, her executive ability and her industriousness are all that the most exacting school patron could demand.

Halligan for County Attorney.

One of the important offices to be filled at this time is the office of county attorney. This office is particularly important at this time for the reason that a suit is now pending in the district court of Lincoln county, brought by the Union Pacific railroad company to compel the board of equalization of Lincoln county to raise the assessed value of all of the real estate in the county.

The candidate of the republican party for the office of county attorney is E. R. Halligan, who was born in Ogalala in 1887. He has resided in North Platte since 1896, and graduated from the academic department of the state university in 1910, and from the law department of the state university in 1912. Since his graduation he has been employed in the office of Wilcox & Halligan in this city where he has a varied experience in all the various branches of the law. If Mr. Halligan is elected to this office, the people will feel the important legal business of the county will have the best of attention.

To the Voters of Lincoln County.
I am on the republican ticket as a candidate for Lieutenant Governor. This is the first time western Nebraska has been recognized for a position in Nebraska.

As a Lincoln county citizen and a member of the last two sessions of the state legislature, I believe I have accomplished something for western Nebraska, in the protection of its school, stock, and agricultural and irrigation interests. We are now trying to solve the problems, with the government, as to the water in the North Platte river. This means much for western Nebraska.

As lieutenant governor of this state I believe I will be in a position to be of service to the people of Lincoln county and western Nebraska. There ought to be no question of partisan politics in voting for western Nebraska interests. I would appreciate the support of all the Lincoln county voters, regardless of their party affiliations, for the office of lieutenant governor.

To the Voters and Tax Payers of Lincoln County.

I am a candidate for county attorney of Lincoln county.

In aspiring to that office, I believe I have the requisite ability to perform its duties, not only to prosecute the persons charged with crime within the county, but also to conduct any civil litigation in which the county may be involved.

In this point it is instructive to review a portion of the history of the county regarding civil actions in which the county has been involved. Some years ago, the exact date I am unable to give, the Union Pacific Railroad company brought an action in the federal court to restrain the treasurer of Lincoln county, and the county officers from selling the railroad land within the county for taxes. In this suit the commissioners considered it necessary to employ assistant counsel to the county attorney at an expense of \$1000.00. Later the county again became involved in a civil action with the Union Pacific railroad company in the United States court concerning the county road which the county commissioners had located on the outer one hundred feet of the railroad company's right of way. This litigation in the state and federal courts also cost the county over \$1000.00 for attorneys' fees paid to attorneys to assist the county attorney.

Coming down nearer to present time, in June, 1914, the Union Pacific railroad company brought an action to compel the board of equalization to raise the assessed values of all of the lands situated in Lincoln county. The county commissioners again employed additional counsel to assist the county attorney and this litigation is now pending and undetermined in the district court of Lincoln county, Nebraska, and without doubt on the termination of the case in the district court will be carried to the supreme court, as all of these cases are in which the railroad company is a party. At the termination of these suits this county will again be called upon to pay additional attorneys' fees in a greater or lesser sum.

These services should be performed by the county attorney without extra compensation. You elect a county attorney to conduct the litigation of the county and advise the county officers, and if elected, I will conduct the legal business of the county without extra expense to the county. If at any time I should feel that I require, or the commissioners feel that I require assistance, I will procure the necessary legal assistance at my own expense.

I believe the salary paid the county attorney of Lincoln county is sufficient to procure the best legal talent to attend to the legal affairs of the county.

ERNEST E. SANDY

SUCCUMBS TO TYPHOID

Ernest E. Sandy, for over twenty-five years a resident of this vicinity, died Friday night shortly before twelve o'clock at his home on north Locust street of typhoid fever from which he had been suffering for a little over a week. He was thirty-eight years, eight months and twenty-four days old at the time of his death and he leaves a wife and four children.

Mr. Sandy was born January 22, 1877, at Sandyville, Iowa. He came here when but a small boy and has continued to make his home either in or near North Platte since that time. He was taken sick about ten days before his death and continued to grow weaker. He had a severe attack of the fever and was out of his head a great part of the time.

In 1902 Mr. Sandy married Ellen Ballard of this city and to them was born one child, Orville, aged ten. The wife died in 1904. In 1908 he remarried, this time uniting in marriage to Miss Jessie McMain, who now survives him. To them were born three children, all of whom are living. They are Letha, aged 5, Mildred, aged 3 and Vernon, aged five months.

Mr. Sandy is well known in this city and to many people over the county. He was for a number of years a dealer in horses in this city. For the past few years he has been working about the city on a project of his own. He was always known as a good fellow and had many friends.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon at two o'clock from the home at the corner of Tenth and Locust streets, Rev. B. A. Cram, of the Methodist church officiating.

AN ORDINANCE, NO. 56.

Providing for the making of a permanent survey by the city engineer of a center line of 9th street between Maple and Pine streets in the city of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska, for the purpose of having a permanent line from which to lay curbing in said street between Maple and Pine streets in said city of North Platte, Nebraska and to repeal all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

Be ordained by the mayor and city council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska:

Sec. 1. That the city engineer is hereby ordered and instructed that he at once upon the passage, approval and publication of this ordinance, survey and establish the center line of 9th street of the city of North Platte, Nebraska, beginning at the already established monument at the intersection of 9th and Maple street and running in an easterly direction to a point 3 feet north of the now established monument at the intersection of 9th and Pine streets, in the city of North Platte, Nebraska, and that he fix upon said center line permanent and lasting monuments at the intersection of all streets crossing said 9th street between Maple and Pine streets in said city. Said monuments to be of the same materials and conform in every respect with the monuments already established in said city.

Sec. 2. That said survey and line so ascertained, marked, established and perpetuated, shall be taken and considered correct by any and all future city engineers, from which to determine the line upon which curbs hereafter shall be laid in said 9th street between Maple and Pine streets, in said city of North Platte, Nebraska.

Sec. 3. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage approval and publication according to law.
