**Soldier's Funeral Will be Held This Afternoon.**

The funeral of Edward Gilberg, the discharged soldier who died in jail Monday night, will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock under the auspices of the United Spanish War Veterans and members of the G. A. R. Rev. C. B. Harman of the Lutheran church will have charge of the funeral and the remains will be interred in the local cemetery.

Inquiry was sent to Washington Tuesday morning regarding Gilberg and it was learned that he had been in the service for over twenty years and that he was retired. He saw service in the Philippines and was honorably discharged on account of disability. It was also learned that a brother Neal H. Gilberg, was located at Cambridge, Mass., and that is the only relative known in this country. The brother was notified and he advised burial here.

Gilberg served in Company M, Fifteenth United States Infantry. He was located at Fort McDowell, Calif., at the time of his discharge which was Sept. 8th, last. At that time he was paid over three hundred dollars, but indications would tend to show that he was probably drugged and robbed. He was a little past forty-four years of age. At the time of his discharge he was given a record of good character. The cause of his death was discovered upon post mortem examination to be acute hemorrhagic pancreatitis.

**WAR SUMMARY**

The French war office claims that substantial progress is being made in the north, where an attack in force by the Germans has been repulsed at several points. It is denied that the Germans have made any gains at Verdun and it is insisted at every point the allies find the situation satisfactory.

The British warships are driving the Germans back from northern France and the Belgian coast and the French field guns with the Belgian forces are clearing the Belgian frontier. Reports coming from Portugal say that a royal revolution has broken out in Lisbon.

The war office reports that the general situation in Russian-Poland and Galicia is excellent and that the Russians everywhere are on the offensive, but denies that the battle has entered a decisive stage.

A Pekin report says that the Japanese and British have sustained heavy losses in the Kaio Chou district. The Russian government is said to have with drawn all of her force from Manchuria and Liberia for action against the Germans and Austrians.

The German war office declares that the advance towards Dunkirk continues and while severe fighting is in progress on the German right wing, the battle has no appearance of having entered a decisive stage. In Galicia it is stated that the Austrians defeated the Russians with heavy loss.

The combined bombardment of Cattaro from land and sea continues and several Austrian forts are reported badly damaged.

The military expert of a leading Berlin paper estimates the losses of the French, the British, the Russians and the Belgians in killed, wounded and prisoners at least 750,000 men.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has been unable to supply the demand for male stenographers and typewriters in the government service, especially in Washington, D. C. Young men who are willing to accept an entrance salary of \$340 to \$500 per annum have excellent opportunities for appointment and rapid advancement. Those who attain a rating of eighty-five per cent in stenography and have had two years experience in practical office work are sometimes given an entrance salary of \$1,200. Examinations are held monthly, except in December, in 400 of these principal cities of the U. S. and application may be filed with the commissioner at Washington, D. C., at any time.

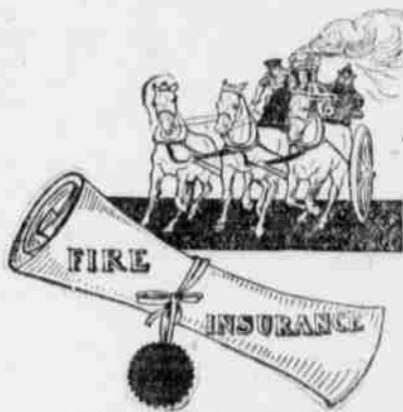
