ROBERT PARMLEE ARRESTED ON ANOTHER SERIOUS CHARGE

Robert Parmlee was arrested yesterday morning by Deputy Sheriff Roy Wilson on the charge of statutory rape, the complaining witness being Minnie Thieda, a young girl under eighteen years of age. He was brought to jail and was taken before the judge yesterday afternoon. He entered a plea of not guilty and waived preliminary examination. He was released on bonds of \$500 which were furnished by T. S. McCrone.

Parmlee was arrested last spring on the same charge against Freida Thieda and is now awaiting trial on that count. This second count is alleged to have been committed in April, about the time of the first case.

Cattle Scourge Spreading Fast. Washington, Nov. 5.—Placing of a federal quarantine on shipment of live stock out of Ohio and Wisconsin and reports of the rapid spread of the foot and mouth disease in states already quarantined marked the day's developments at the Department of Agriculture in the fight against the worst epidemic of the infection ever known in the United States.

Scores of additional federal inspectors were rushed into the field to trace every shipment from infected centers. Reports from inspectors already at work led department officials to predict tonight that many other communities soon will be affected.

WAR SUMMARY

No British warships are in Chilean ports. The fate of the three British cruisers that engaged five German warships off the coast of Chile and the transport that accompanied them, remains a mystery.

Great Britain has declared war on Turkey, and the Ottoman government, despite dissonance in the cabinet, is definitely committed to hostilities against Great Britain, France and Serbia.

The new drive for the sea coast of the heavily reinforced German forces in Belgium has been met by a counter offensive of the also augmented armies of the allies in the vicinity of Ypres.

"The Franco-British lines have at no point drawn back," says the afternoon French official statement, and our troops undertaking the offensive have made notable progress in several directions.

It is declared that the allies have made slight progress to the east of Neuport and that German attacks from Dixmude to the Lys are being made with less energy. Renewed German activity is reported on the center without notable change, and on the right of the allies the situation remains deadlocked.

The Russians are claiming that the Germans are falling back not only in Russian Poland, but also on the east Prussian frontier, and that Russian troops have penetrated at points on the east Prussian border.

Election News

From counties so far reporting, some in full and some partial, Morehead has a lead of about 16,000 votes. The remainder of the candidates on the democratic and republican tickets are running neck and neck. Eleven counties complete, including Douglas, gives Morehead 20,959 and Pearson 20,912, a difference of only forty-seven votes.

The vote on woman's suffrage as tabulated by today's Bee, shows a majority of about 2500 against the proposition. This table includes Douglas county, where the majority against was 1,000.

The vote on congressman in the Fifth Nebraska district is very close. The returns up to last evening gave Barton a lead of less than 300. The contest in the First district is also close, Reavis leading McGuire by less than a hundred votes. Kinkaid's majority in this, the Sixth district, will be very large.

A New York dispatch states that the

democrats will have a majority of twenty-five in the lower house of congress, while in the senate there will be fifty-five democrats and forty republicans.

Douthett is elected to the state senate from this district and Woodhurst has a nice majority over McCarthy for floor representative. Each of these are elected from districts composed of Lincoln, Dawson and Keith counties.
