Notice to Water Consumers. All parties having meters set in tile or boxes outside the house should note that they are properly packed against freezing. This applies to those renting meters as well as those owning meters. Section 6 of the water ordinance holds the property owner renting meters responsible for damages to the meter by freezing or by hot water. The method of packing meters recommended by the water department is as follows: Have a wooden cover made a trifle smaller than the inside of the tile or box (to allow for expansion in case the cover gets damp). Stand four pieces of 2x4 or other boards up in the tile for cover to rest on. Make these pieces of 2x4 long enough to hold cover up about two inches above top of meter. Set the cover on top of the 2x4's. Then pack remaining space between wooden cover and top of the tile with leaves in sacks or other material and put on iron cover. This method of packing leaves a dead air space which is one of the best protections against frost, all around the meter and pipes and allows meter to be read without much trouble. Meters will only be read once during the winter and if packed as described meter reader can remove and replace same in as good condition as it was at first. Where rags or leaves are shoved down between pipes and side of tile or where meters are wrapped up in several layers of sacks they are liable to become wet and touching the side of the tile freeze and carry the frost directly to the meter or pipes. Do not put manure around meters. This is especially bad if it becomes wet as the fumes and acid attack the registering mechanism of the meter corroding it so badly as to ruin it.

Property owners' attention is also called to section 3 of the water ordinance. Under its provisions if water bills are not paid within the next quarter after they become due they go upon the taxes against the property and service is discontinued until bill is paid. There are a number of delinquents this quarter and unless these bills are paid soon service will be discontinued and bills will be reported to the City Council to be placed on the tax list.

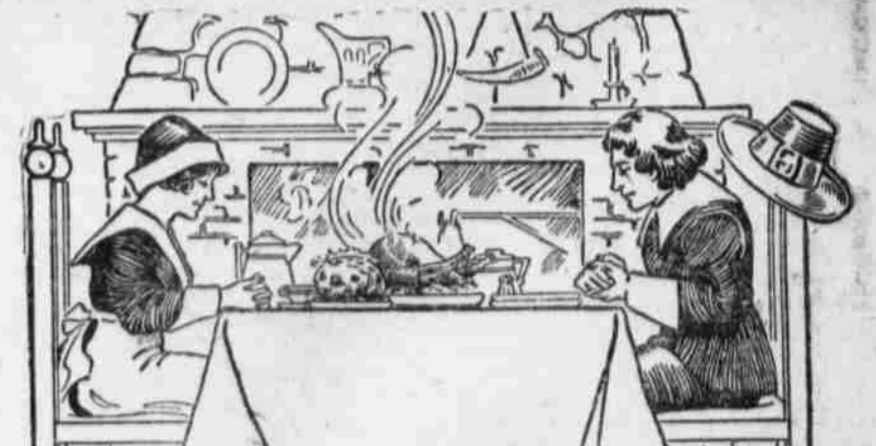
