A. B. Hoagland has been engaged in auditing the books of the water commissioner for several days past and will complete the work this week. There is now about \$12,000 in outstanding warrants, but to partially meet this there is about \$5,000 due from water users who are delinquent on last quarter's payment. It begins to look as though it will be necessary to raise the water rates in order to make the plant self sustaining.

**U. P. Sues for Right-of-Way.**

The Union Pacific railroad company has started action in Buffalo county for the recovery of the second one hundred foot right-of-way on either side of the railroad. On Friday afternoon twenty cases were filed by the Union Pacific attorney against twenty land owners and farmers along the Buffalo county right-of-way, in which recovery of from one hundred to one hundred and fifty feet of land is petitioned for.

The railroad company in their petition, assert that the land owners are unlawfully in possession of said second one hundred foot right-of-way, the Union Pacific Railroad Co. having secured possession of the same by a special act of congress, July 1, 1862, at which time that body granted 400 feet of land from the east to the west coast, in order to have cross continent travel established.—Kearney Hub.
