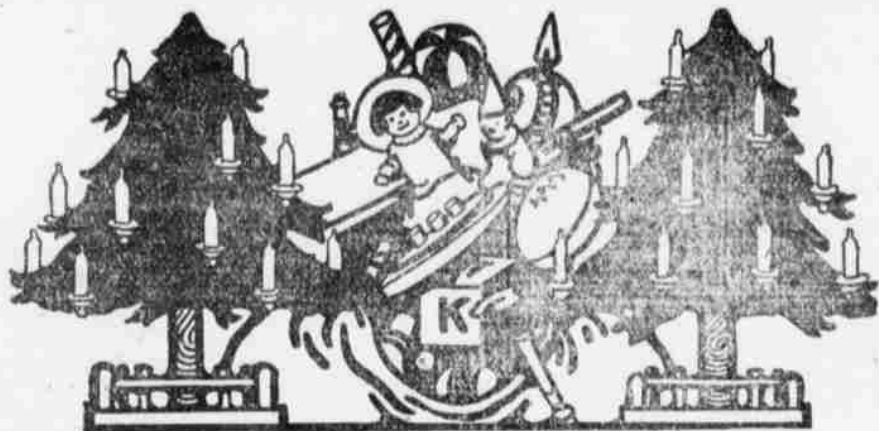

### AN ORDINANCE

No. 58.

Providing for the appropriation of Private Property for the use of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, for a street by purchase or condemnation: Providing for the appointment of three disinterested freeholders of the City of North Platte to assess the damages and time and place of meeting of said assessors; Providing for the payment of said damages and providing for the filing of a plat of the property appropriated.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska:

SECTION 1. That the City of North Platte, hereby purchase, condemn and appropriate the following described private property for the use of a street within said city to-wit:

A portion of the County Clerk's Sub-division of fractional Lot 2 of Section 33, Township 14, North of Range 39, west of the 6th P. M. and the unplatted portion of the South Half of the Northeast quarter of Section 32, Township 14, North of Range 39, West of the 5th P. M. lying north of the main line of the Union Pacific Railroad necessary for the opening of the extension of 9th Street to the width of 80 feet. The particular tracts of land to be proportioned and used for said street being more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

1. Beginning at the SE corner of Lot J, running thence N. 10 degrees E. along the east line of said lot J 41 feet, thence N. 80 degrees W. parallel

with the South line of Lot J 326.45 feet, to the west line of said Lot J, thence south on the west line of Lot J, 41.7 feet to the SW corner of Lot J, thence S. 89 degrees E. 313.3 feet to the South line of said Lot J to the place of beginning, containing 30 acres.

2. Beginning at the NE corner of Lot D, running thence N. 80 degrees W. along the north line of said Lot D 135 feet to the NW corner of said Lot D, thence in the same direction along the north line of lot E 76 feet; together 211 feet, thence S. 10 degrees W. 39 feet, thence S. 89 degrees E. parallel with the north line of said lots D and E 76 and 135 feet together 211 feet, to the place of beginning, containing 19 acres.

3. Beginning at the NW corner of Lot E, running thence S 80 degrees E. along the north line of Lot E 102.3 feet, thence S. 10 degrees W. 39 feet, with the north line of said lot E. 95.5 feet to the west line of Lot E, thence north on the West line of Lot E 39.6 feet to the place of beginning, containing 69 acres.

SECTION 2. That O. E. Elder and Victor VonGoetz, Sr. and F. W. Her-

minghausen being three disinterested freeholders of the City of North Platte, be and are hereby named assessors and will meet at the office of the City Clerk at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of the 20th day of January, 1915, for the purpose of apportioning and assessing the damages according to law.

SECTION 3. That the whole amount of damages and expense incurred in the creation of said street shall be assessed and levied upon the real property fronting upon the same and other property nearby that may be benefited thereby, in proportion according to benefits.

SECTION 4. That within sixty days after the condemnation of the above described private property an accurate plat of clear description shall be filed in the office of the county Clerk of Lincoln County, Nebraska.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
