Will Deliver all Parcels On Christmas Morning

"All Christmas parcels will be de-Hvered on Christmas morning," is the statement made by Postmaster Davis yesterday. The office here put on extra help and one complete delivery of letters will be made and automobiles will be used for all the Christmas packages arriving tomorrow.

Two automobiles have been in use all this week making deliveries and they will both be put in use tomorrow morning. In addition to these Mr. Davis announces that they have two extra cars that can be put in use at a moment's notice if they are needed. Chrismus Day is a legal holiday and the postoffice employees are allowed to make it such but they are willing to work in order that others may enjoy their Vuletide festival to the fullest

The deliveries of packages this week have been exceptionally large. Thus far they have averaged over five hundred parcels each day and tomorrow it will probably be larger than that. The outgoing parcels have amounted to more than that but no record of them has been kept.

A new parcel post station has been operating near the depot this week for the purpose of routing the parcels that are sent any distance east or west. This in the charge of C. S. Holley, chief clerk of the railway postoffice between Omaha and Ogden. He has four assistants and they are kept busy all of the time.

This is to route the parcels when there are so many that the clerks on the trains can not handle them. For instance, a carload of parcels to be sent over into Iowa was sent out this week and they routed the parcels to the five terminal stations in Iowa where they were be sent to the different towns. There were so many pack age: that the clerks on the trains could not handle them with the local parcels and routing them here expedites their delivery quite materially.

Postmaster Davis hopes to make a regular terminal of North Platte for another year so that all that work will be done in the office the same as is done in Omaha. That would require some men the year round and during the holiday rush would probably take at least twelve or fifteen. It would be established for the purpose of handling the deliveries from Cheyenne on west and the parcels from the west that go east of Nebraska:






