Final Beet Shipments

The final beet shipments from the North Platte territory to the Grand Island factory will be made today and tomorrow. These shipments will consist of about ten car loads from O'Fallon and a similar quantity from Sarben. Farmers, as a rule, are well satisfied with this year's crop, and Field Agent Bryan does not anticipate having any trouble in securing the 1915 acreage allotted to his territory.

Since beginning the campaign the Grand Island factory has averaged slicing 420 tons of beets per day, and the production has been so heavy that the factory has made a longer campaign than usual.

Company "Q" Holds Banquet

Twenty-five of the old members and friends of company Q met at the Palace cafe Saturday evening and held their banquet in honor of the members who are home from school for the holidays. A pleasant time was enjoyed with toasts, music and singing and a nice four course supper was served.

Supper was served at ten o'clock. It was pronounced one of the most excellent the boys have ever enjoyed. Following the "feed" the meeting was called to order by "Pat" Norris who acted as toastmaster. He introduced the speakers and nearly all present responded to toasts. A very jolly time was enjoyed.

Returns from War Zone

Sam Pulos was visiting friends in this city yesterday morning and told some exciting tales of the Balkan war and of the present European war. He left this city for Greece two years ago and enlisted in the Grecian army to fight against Turkey and has but recently returned. He is now employed as scout foreman at Kearney.

Mr. Pulos stated that he participated in seven battles in the Balkan war. In the second battle he received a bullet wound in the right shoulder but the bullet went straight through without breaking a bone. He was ordered to the hospital but stated that he had come home to fight and was allowed to remain with the army.

In two battles he was in bayonet charges. The battle lines had formed only three miles apart and as they gradually closed up with great loss of men the order for charge was given. These, he said, were the most exciting. The Greeks came out victorious in both.

He stated that over seventy thousand Greeks from this country returned there for the Balkan war and that of that number twenty-five thousand were killed. The price was dear but it was worth it, he said, as much territory was added.

Regarding the present war he stated that all European experts who are posted on the subject state that it cannot but last three years at the most. "Germany will be whipped," he stated, "but it will be with a great loss of men. Greece will be in it soon."

He stated that in Europe they believe that this war is a scourge from God and that all the nations of the world will be in it sooner or later.
