State Aid Bridge Bonds Bought by Chicago Company

The \$25,000 bonds voted last August for the state aid bridge across the Platte river on the proposed Lincoln Highway were sold last week to Hanchett & Company, a Chicago firm. Of all the bids submitted this company gave the highest and best bid on the bonds.

These bonds are for \$12,000 at five per cent interest voted by North Platte and \$13,000 at six per cent interest voted by Platte precinct. A premium of sixty dollars was given on the North Platte bonds and of four hundred twenty-seven dollars on the Platte precinct bonds. In all the county will receive \$25,487 for the \$25,000 bonds.

The company will receive interest on the five per cent bonds at the rate of approximately 4.95 per cent and on the six per cent bonds of approximately 5.70 per cent.

The bonds are in denominations of \$1,000 each, and two will mature July 1, 1925, and two each year thereafter, the final two falling due July 1, 1944.

A Valuable Find

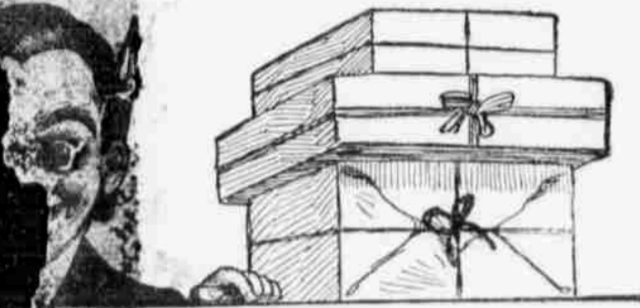
